The application of George Harte, per E. W. Scatcherd, for compensation from the city for having fallen on an alleged defective roadway at the corner of Richmond and York streets, was referred to the engineer.

Chairman Wyatt, Ald. Forristal and Gerry, Secretary Bell and Assistant Engineer Kirkpatrick were present.

INSTALLED AT CATHEDRAL

Interesting Ceremony Performed at St. Paul's Last Night.

New Dignitaries Take Office—Transfer of Official Seat.

The installation of the dean, archdeacon and canons, recently appointed by the Bishop of Huron, attracted a large congregation to St. Paul's Cathedral, last night. The chancellor's place was taken by Mr. F. P. Betts, Chancellor Cronyn being ill.

The regular service of evening prayer began at 8 o'clock. At the close of this the bishop announced the transfer of his official seat and that of the cathedral chapter from the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity to the Church of St. Paul. He explained that the first chapter of this diocese was established by his predecessor, Rev. Isaac Hellmuth. At that time it was proposed that the Cathedral should be Holy Trinity, but it was necessary to make the change. The present deed was to show the continuity of his action. The deed transferring the transfer to St. Paul's was read by the acting chancellor and handed to Dean Davis.

The ceremony of installation was impressive, being conducted by Dean Davis, Archdeacon Richardson, Williams, Hill and Young. Following the reading of the presentation by the lord bishop, the candidate would make reply, while in the case of the dean, the bishop would lead him to the stall allotted to him in the cathedral. In the case of the archdeacons and canons, that part of the ceremony was performed by the dean. Following each installation the acting chancellor would read the declaration.

The installation was as follows: Venerable Evans Davis, M. A., Archdeacon of London, and Rector of St. James' Church, as Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral.

Rev. William Arthur Young, D. D., Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral and Rector of St. John's Church, Woodhouse, as Archdeacon of Norfolk.

Rev. David Williams, M. A., Rector of St. James' Church, Stratford, as Archdeacon of Perth.

Rev. Arundel Charles Hill, M. A., Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral and Rector of Trinity Church, St. Thomas, as Archdeacon of Elgin.

Rev. James Banning Richardson, M. A., Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral, and Rector of St. John's Church, London Township, as Archdeacon of London.

Rev. John Dwyer, E. D., Rector of Trinity Church, Watford, as Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral.

Rev. J. C. Farthing, M. A., Rector of St. Paul's Church, Woodstock, as Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral.

Owing to illness, Rev. William Craig, B. D., Rector of Christ Church, Petrolia, who was also to have been installed as a canon, was prevented from being present.

The installation sermon was preached by Rev. Prof. Cody, of Toronto. He said at the outset that it was proper that this solemn ceremony should be performed in public. The ceremony, he said, took them back a thousand years, in fact, back to the foundation days of Christianity. It was an honorary reward for service, but it could be made more than a mere honor.

The dean and canons in closer touch with the bishop, and they were the men through whom the bishop could discharge his duties. He prayed that God might endow them with the proper spirit. Speaking of persistence and service, as means leading to holiness, the speaker said a word against cheap sensationalism, which he was thankful to say, the church had not indulged in, and he hoped she would never do so. He pleaded for service and humility, saying, in conclusion, that he who served the most was as great as a king.
