Interesting Ceremony Performed at St. Paul's Last Night.

New Dignituries Take Office-Transfer of Official Seat.

The installation of the dean, archdea cons and canons, recently appointed by the Bishop of Huron, attracted a large congregation to St. Paul's Cathedral. last night. The chancellor's place was taken by Mr. F. P. Betts, Chancellor Cronvn being ill.

The regular service of evening prayer began at 8 o'clock. At the close of this the bishop announced the transference of his official seat and that of the cathedral chapter from the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity to the Church of St. Paul. He explained that the first chapter of this diocese was established by his predecessor, Rev. Isaac Hellmuth At that time it was proposed that the Cathedral should be Holy Trinity, but it was necessary to make the change. The present deed was to show the continuity of his action. The deed confirming the transference to St. Paul's

was read by the acting chancellor and handed to Dean Davis. The ceremony of installation was impressive, being conducted by Dean Davis, Archdeacons Richardson, Williams, Hill and Young. Following the reading of the presentation by the lord bishop, the candidate would make reply, while in the case of the dean, the bishop would lead him to the stall allotted to him in the cathedral. In the case of the archdeacons and canons that part of the ceremony was per formed by the dean. Following each installation the acting chancellor would
