Apparently the Russian forces have taken the offensive. London is informed the main advance has commenced two armies one of them from Vladivostock and one from Manchurla converging on the Yalu River. A Jap army, 70,000 strong, is in Northern Korea, headed towards the south bank of the Yalu, where it is said the Russians have thrown up fortffications. Another important news item is that Russia has warned Kerea that she will be considered a billigerent because of her alliance with Japan. Jap naval losses since the opening of the war are placed at four cruisers and five torpedo boat destroyers. The machinery of a battleship has also been badly crippled by Russian shells. These reports come by way of Paris, which is anti-Jap. It is again reported that Port Arthur was badly damaged by the various Jap bombardments.
