WILL BE PUT INTO A BLUE BOOK

London, Jan. 23.—The Government here has heard from Governor Swettenham concerning the incident involving the withdrawal of the American warships from Kingston. Absolute secrecy is maintained at the colonial office, but the fact was elicited that during the night a good many telegrams were received from Swettenham, some of which deal with the incident. These, it is understood, confirm the main features of the affair as already published.

It is not the present intention of the colonial office to make the telegrams public, the official view being that it is a personal affair between a Government department and an official, which is properly adjustable between them, and the authorities incline to the view that general interests will best be served by having the replies appear in a blue book at some distant period; in the meantime being dealt with through the usual diplomatic channels, for intercourse between power and power.
