The suffragettes gave an indication of their determined attitude at their last meeting. When the presiding officer asked for ten volunteers to take a petition to Premier Asquith on Monday, saying, "This may mean three months' imprisonment or thirteen, but certainly a long term this time," over a score of volunteers jumped to their
