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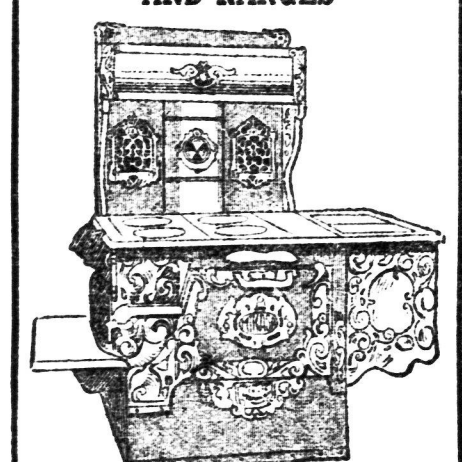

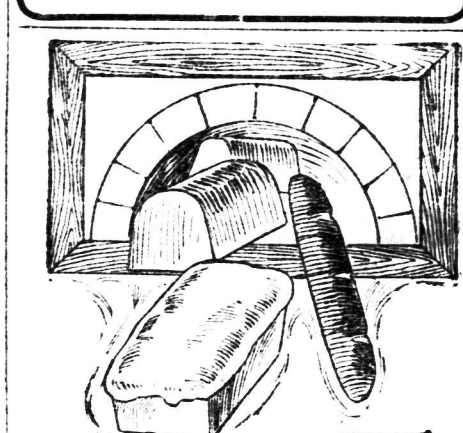

**REV. DR. SMYTH
TO YOUNG MEN**

Special Sermons to Mark 77th
Anniversary of St. Paul's
Cathedral.

SUNDAY IN CHURCHES

Many Topics of Interest Touched Upon
by Local Pastors Yesterday.

In city churches yesterday, at both
the morning and evening service, large
congregations were present.

In Dundas Centre and Wellington
Street Methodist Churches special edu-
cational sermons were preached by
Dr. F. H. Wallace and Rev. Prof. R. T.
Hewitt, both of Victoria University,
Toronto.

At St. Paul's Cathedral special ser-
vices, which will continue throughout
the week, were held in commemoration
of the 77th anniversary of the church.
In Anglican churches throughout the
diocese a special pastoral letter issued
by the Canadian bishops of the Angli-
can church, and signed by 23 of them,
was read, and an appeal made for a
collection for both home and foreign
missions.

St. Paul's Anniversary.
The preacher for the day at St. Paul's
Cathedral was Rev. Dr. Patterson
of the University of Toronto. He pre-
sented the second of a series of ser-
mons on "The Letters to the Seven
Churches." "God always recognizes
every good feature that it is possible
to find in a man's character," he said.
"There are so many men today who
sit looking for faults and mistakes in-
stead of for good things to make the
most of. If a man, particularly a man
in a high position, commits some error
or a number of weaknesses how ready
some men are to make the most of it,
and while the world is magnifying the
fault of one hour's weakness the many
years in which the man conquered the
weakness are utterly forgotten."

Discipleship.
At Chalmers' Church yesterday
morning, Rev. Walter Moffatt spoke
on "Discipleship," and showed that if
people say, "He is such a fine young
man," but is led away by evil compa-
nions.

Inquiring for the Boys.
Dr. Smyth said that, placed as he is
in Montreal, his church being situated
among a big station, through which
200,000 men mostly young fellows pass
every year on their way to this new
country he is constantly in receipt of
letters from people in England inquir-
ing about the boys.

"When a man thinks he is going to
live just to make money," he said,
"and have a good time by spending it
on pleasure, he is living like an an-
imal, and lost all sense of the better
things of life. It is only a question
of time before he goes down. Did you
ever see a young man come out here
from the old country and be laughed
over his purity and religion? If you
have ever been the cause of such a
thing, think of his sorrowing mother
at home, and think how your own
mother would feel."

In concluding, Dr. Smyth said that
now in the new year is the time to
make good resolutions and stick to
them, and one of the best any young
man can make is to lead a pure Chris-
tian life.

Dundas Centre Church.
Both Dr. Wallace and Professor
Bowles spoke at Dundas Centre
Church yesterday, and in the morn-
ing Dr. Wallace pointed out the dan-
gers of their cheapness. With the
facilities for education, children
want to know things. They ask why
all through the public schools, they
ask why all through the high schools,
and when they come to college they
still ask why. The colleges, he said,
must be in a position to answer their
questions, and he made a strong ap-
peal to the churches to recognize
their responsibility and show their
sympathy with higher education.

At the evening service Professor
Bowles gave a history of Methodism.
Profits and Losses.
"Profits and Losses" was the theme
of Rev. Thomas Mitchell's sermon at
the New St. James' Church yesterday
morning. "The old year has passed,"
he said, "and the holiday season is
over. The time has come to estimate
our gains, and our losses. Every gain
means also some loss, and every loss
means some gain. This reflection
should steady our lives and stop all
vain regrets."

The Love of God.
"Keep Yourselves in the Love of
God" was the motto given to his con-
gregation by Rev. Mr. Walker, of the
South London Baptist Church in a
New Year's sermon yesterday morn-

**ALLEGED BLACK HAND
ON TRIAL AT TOLEDO**

Fourteen Sicilians Charged With
Blackmailing Fellow-Countrymen.
Toledo, Jan. 10.—The case against
fourteen Sicilians, members of the
Society of the Bannan, an alleged
Black Hand band of Ohio, was called
for trial in federal court today. With
a small army of witnesses, mounting
evidence, added in the hands of the
defendants raised last June by postal
inspectors, the Government expects to
prove that the alleged headquarters of
the band in Marion, Ohio, were the
centre of widespread Black Hand
operations.

Twenty lawyers are engaged in the
defense.
The indictments contain 14 counts,
alleging attempts to extort money
from as many Italians by means of
threatening letters.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC
Investigation at New York Will End
in Several Arrests.
[Associated Press.]

New York, Jan. 10.—In the grand
jury room today, District Attorney
Whitman asked the investigators of
the "White Slave" traffic to find ac-
cused against certain individuals
who he is believed to be leaders in the
business. It is believed that search-
ing investigation undertaken by John
D. Rockefeller, jun., as foreman of the
special jury, has already proceeded
far enough as to show that not only
that a white slave traffic exists here,
but that there are close relations be-

between traffickers in London, in
principal cities of the country, and
that many of the latter are in the
city is being traced through the
companies, and it is reported that one
man, or syndicate, has been found to
own several such places here.

traffic were summoned by Mr. Rock-
efeller and his associates to give their
testimony today.
