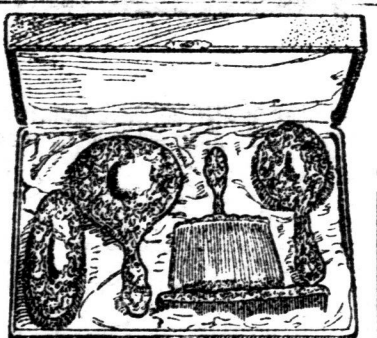

A FACULTY OF MUSIC ADDED TO WESTERN

Will Share With Toronto Board of Governors—Agrees to Important New Department For Local University.

A faculty of music was added to the Western University at a meeting of the board of governors, held in Mayor Beattie's office on Saturday afternoon. There has long been a demand for such a department. Hundreds of graduates in music throughout Western Ontario have been given their degrees from the University of Toronto, but from this time on the Western will share with the provincial university the right to give diplomas.

Mr. Justice Meredith, chairman of the board, presented the report of the special committee appointed to inquire into the matter. The recommendation that the faculty be installed was unanimous, and an agreement was prepared.

In addition Mr. Meredith pointed out that a number of English universities were endeavoring to have musical examinations conducted in this country. Since Toronto University had the only faculty of music, that institution held all the examinations throughout Western Ontario.

Mr. R. Anderson, president of the Brantford Conservatory of Music, and Mr. F. L. Willgoose, president of the London Conservatory of Music, were present, and explained their courses to the governors. Both were of the opinion that the new curricula would provide a much more thorough musical education than the course supplied by Toronto University.

The agreements were ordered executed, and the members of the faculty will be selected shortly.

Those present at the meeting were: Mr. Justice Meredith, chairman; Capt. T. J. Murphy, T. H. Smallman, Samuel Stevely, Arthur W. White and President James.

COMMISSION TO USE STREET RAILWAY POLES

Commercial Lighting Cables Will Not Be Put Down Until Spring.

At a meeting of the water commissioners, held Saturday, it was decided to arbitrate for a piece of property belonging to Wm. Gray at the corner of the Wortley road and Horton street. This land is needed for the Springbank line, and an agreement was made to purchase it some time ago. However, the negotiations were never completed, and the board will submit the matter to arbitration. Mr. M. D. Fraser will represent the commissioners.

A communication was read from the London street railway, in which they agreed to allow the city to string wires on their poles down town for lighting the streets.

It was decided to delay the installation of the commercial lighting cable until spring, and in the meantime the commission will purchase enough to supply the street lighting. About \$2,000 worth will be needed.

The London street railway complained about the size of their water bill, but as the meter was found to be working satisfactorily it was decided to file the account.

DEATH NOT THE END SAYS NOTED ORATOR

Inspiring and Eloquent Address by Hon. G. R. Wendling.

The Auditorium was crowded yesterday afternoon when Hon. G. R. Wendling, noted jury lawyer, of Washington, D. C., delivered an address entitled, "Is Death the End?"

To absolutely convince the average modern audience on such a subject is no easy task, especially in this day of skepticism, and it speaks volumes for Mr. Wendling's eloquence and reasoning to say that before he was half-finished his hearers were convinced that "if a man die he shall live again." Possessing a splendid voice of much depth and carrying power, and perfect enunciation, Mr. Wendling compelled the attention of his listeners.

In the opening of his address he stated that death seems to be the end, but the old adage says that things are not what they seem, and it eventually broadens down to a conflict between appearances and truth. When the body dies the soul does not necessarily die too. Because man appears to be wholly extinguished in death, there is no real proof that it is so. I will not believe what I do not know is the cry today of modern skepticism," said Mr. Wendling, "but we find in every department of life where men have believed more than they knew, and believing he toiled on until at last we have the magnetic power of electrical telegraph, in a single word, with the great French actress a peculiar young men, faith, not blind superstition."
