MANY ATTEMPTS MADE TO BREAK INTO STORES

Would-be Robbers Were Prevented By Watchfulness of Owners.

The residents of East London are becoming alarmed at the numerous attempts of burglars to break into grocery stores in that vicinity. Early Sunday morning an attempt was made to enter Depper's grocery store on Hamilton road, and late Sunday night attempts were made to gain entrance into the store of Fred Jones, on Adelaide street, and a store on Rectory street.

In these three instances the efforts of the burglars were unsuccessful, owing to the watchfulness of the people inside.

On Tuesday night a clothing store on Dundas street, was entered, and later the same evening the grocery store of P. Sands was broken into and some cigars, chewing gum and candies were taken. Apparently not satisfied with the first visit to Mr. Sands' store, and in case they had overlooked something, the burglars again visited the place last evening, and once more rifled the candy and chewing gum case, and filled their pockets with a few more of Mr. Sands' cigars.

This would give the impression that the thieves were boys, but from the descriptions given by Mr. Depper and Mr. Jones, who had the pleasure of viewing these midnight visitors, it would appear that they are men, and good-sized men, at that. That the robbery of the Sands store was just a blind to lead the police to believe the burglars were boys, or that it was carried out by a different gang, are questions hard to answer.

A couple of suspicious characters have been seen prowling around East London lately, but as yet nothing definite has been proved against them. Whoever the burglars are, they are causing no little uneasiness among East Londoners, and many are losing their hard-earned sleep by keeping an all-night vigil, in case the robbers should happen to pay a visit. But, as is generally the case, the burglars refuse to come on the night when they are expected, and the all-night parties have come to naught.

It is about time the police took some active steps to put an end to the operations of the gang in East London.

ST. PATRICK'S IS FREE

New York's Catholic Cathedral Is Consecrated at Great Gathering.

New York, Oct. 5.—Three cardinals, the most notable company of princes of the Roman Catholic Church ever assembled in the United States, together with a host of lesser dignitaries, participated in the consecration of the St. Patrick's Cathedral here today. Not less than sixty bishops from all parts of Canada and the United States were included.

Among the prelates attending were the Most Rev. John M. Farley, D. D., Archbishop of New York. The consecration marked the freeing of the cathedral from debt. The occasion was further honored by the participation in the rites by Cardinal Vannutelli, the papal legate; Cardinal Gibbons, the only American cardinal; and Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland. The consecration ceremonies began at an early hour and were long and complicated. The cathedral had been elaborately decorated within and without.

WILL INAUGURATE HYDRO POWER SYSTEM

Big Banquet To Be Held at Berlin on the 11th of October.

Toronto, Oct. 5.—The formal inauguration of the Ontario hydro-electric power system will take place at 3:30 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 11, at a banquet. At the banquet in the evening at 6 o'clock Mr. J. F. Fryer, of Galt, president of the Niagara Power Union, will toast the municipalities. Sir James Whitney will respond to the toast of the province of Ontario, and Hon. Adam Beck to that of the hydro-electric commission.

SAY GRAIN RATES ARE UNREASONABLE

Serious Charges Against Railroads Made at Chicago.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Charges that the eastern railroads have conspired through ownership and control of parallel lake transportation lines to deprive Chicago of the advantages of its geographical location in their construction of rates on wheat and flour to the seaboard, are preferred in a petition addressed to the commerce commission by the Chicago Board of Trade. Seventy-seven carriers are named as defending in the formal complaint which particularly asks a reduction in the rates on "ex-lake" grain east of Buffalo.

Not only are the rates declared to be unreasonable high in themselves, but it is charged that the railroads are applying a much higher rate than is just for the haul from Buffalo east when the initial stage of the journey is by water, than the proportion of the through all rail rate, charging for the same tariff. This, it is declared, tends to give the railroads a monopoly of the traffic by equalizing the rail and water rate from Chicago to Buffalo, and preventing a reduction of the water rates.

GOLDSMITH'S VILLAGE SCHOOL.
