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COUNCIL TAKE STEPS TO OIL THE STREETS

Orders the Purchase of a Cart for the Purpose—Meeting Monday Night.

It looks now as if the city council would seriously consider the question of oiling a number of macadam roads in the city. At the meeting last night, a recommendation was received from No. 3 committee to purchase two new water carts, as there were not sufficient to meet the necessities of the department at this time.

It was the intention of No. 3 committee to oil several streets, but No. 4 committee has been available.

There was considerable opposition to the purchase of two water wagons, Aid. Ritchie pointed out that it was time the council undertook seriously to oil the streets. Other municipalities were doing it with success, and there was no reason why London should not be up-to-date.

However, after some debate, Aid. Mitchell suggested that one cart for water purposes be purchased and another for oil. This was passed, and the two carts will be bought at once.

No Petition.

Ald. Wilson asked that Hyman street be closed, but as there was no petition for it, the motion was ruled out of order.

Ald. Mitchell was named a member of No. 3 committee during the absence of Aid. Ashplant, and Aid. Wilson was named a member of the London and Port Stanley board.

On motion of Aid. Bennett, it was decided to instruct City Solicitor Meredith to take proceedings to compel E. Leonard & Sons to live up to the agreement with the city relative to the use of a portion of York street for their private purposes.
