Cream of Watercress Soup.

Dutch Meat Mold.

Cover two shins of veal with cold water, bring to the boiling point, skim well, add a rounding teaspoonful of salt, a saltspoonful of pepper, two cloves, one bay leaf and a bit of lemon peel, and simmer until the meat is tender. Remove it, strain the liquor, add the strained juice of a lemon and return to the stove to cook down to one pint. With two forks shred the meat fine. Wet a mold in cold water. Chill the liquor until slightly thickened, add the meat and stand aside until firm. Dutch Meat Mold. stand aside until firm.

For the salad, remove the seeds from two green peppers and fill the cavities with cream cheese which has been worked smooth with a little cream and salt and two or three drops of Worcestershire sauce. Lay on ice till very cold, then cut in quarter-inch slices. Lay on lettuce and add French dressing. Pass toasted saltines with this course.
