NEWS

Circus on June 7.—Ringling's circus will appear in London on June 7. Advance agents were in the city yesterday.

Bank Clearings.—The bank clearings for the week ending April 11, 1914, were \$1,601,161; and for the corresponding week of 1913 \$1,954,366.

Took 100,000 Pictures.—One hundred thousand pictures, it is conservatively estimated, were taken by the late Frank Cooper, pioneer London photographer, who died in California on Saturday. When Mr. Cooper retired from business about six or seven years ago, his stock of negatives which he had preserved numbered close to the 100,000 mark. It was one of the largest stocks of negatives in this country.

Illness of Dr. Schram.—Dr. John H. Schram has been seriously ill at his home, 544 Talbot street, for several days past with blood poisoning which, it is thought, he contracted while conducting an operation a week ago. At the time, Dr. Schram had a slight scratch on his hand which became inoculated with the poison virus. His condition was considerably improved yesterday, but it will be some time before he is able to resume his practice.
