**ITALIAN WARSHIPS ORDERED HOME.**

Glasgow, July 28.—Three Italian warships, visiting the Clyde, were ordered today to return immediately to Italian waters.

**CANADIAN PACIFIC AGAIN WEAK STOCKS.**

London, July 28.—A feeling of uncertainty prevailed at the opening of the stock exchange here today, but conditions were not so panicky as they were yesterday. British consols opened at 72½, then fell by slow stages to 71½, but soon rallied again to 72. Continental favorites were offered freely at first, but gradually recovered.

Canadian Pacific were again the weakest feature of the market on continental and settlement liquidation. They went to 4½ below parity, being quoted at 176, but before noon had regained some of the loss and were quoted at 177.

Dealings on the foreign market were still a matter of negotiation, the tone being steady. Discount houses continued to quote no panicky for short and three months' bills, yesterday gold shipment from New York having had practically no effect.

**PARIS AND BERLIN MARKETS VERY LOW.**

Paris, July 28.—Prices at the close of the Bourse were low. Exchange on London and private discounts were not quoted.

Baron Von Schoen, the German ambassador, had a conference with Stenven Martin, acting premier, at the foreign office in the morning, and the members of the cabinet were summoned to meet later in the day.

Berlin, July 28.—(Stock Exchange)—The decline of prices on the Berlin stock exchange continued today, as those firms which were unable to secure the needed funds to carry over engagements were forced to unload.

German Government bonds registered a further fall. Three per cents started 4½ lower at 73½. Vienna, where the bourse was closed, was said to be indulging on Berlin and this contributed to increase the highly nervous state of the market.

**SUSPENDING ALL TRADING IN FUTURES.**

Paris, July 28.—The suspension of all trading in futures was decided on at a general meeting today of the commercial exchange, dealing in grains, sugar and all commodities in bulk. This decision will remain in force until an improvement occurs in the international situation.

**NO MORE PROCESSIONS ALLOWED IN BERLIN.**

Berlin, July 28.—The police authorities of the city today announced that they would not permit any more patriotic processions in the streets of Berlin. Hitherto these had not been interfered with.

**GERMANY ASKS FOR ROMANIAN ASSURANCE.**

Rome, July 28.—Authoritative advice received here from Bucharest state that Germany has asked for positive assurances from Romania of her intentions in connection with the Austro-Servian situation.

## BIG BLAZE AT HULL PRINCIPALLY IN LUMBER

One House Destroyed, Total Damage Amounting to About \$250,000.

Ottawa, Ont., July 28.—About six million feet of sawn lumber, several hundred cords of wood, and one frame house were destroyed in the fire which broke out in the Gilmore and Hughson yards at Hull last night and continued until this morning. The loss will be over \$250,000, nearly all covered by insurance.

## The Warrant For War

(Canadian Press.)

Vienna, July 28.—The declaration of war was gazetted here late this afternoon. The text as follows:

"The Royal Government of Serbia not having replied in a satisfactory manner to the note remitted to it by the Austro-Hungarian minister in Belgrade, on July 23, 1914, the Imperial and Royal Government finds itself compelled to proceed itself to safeguard its rights and interests and to have recourse for this purpose to force of arms.

"Austria-Hungary considers itself therefore from this moment in a state of war with Serbia.

"(Signed) COUNT BERTHOLD, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Austria-Hungary."

## EX-CONVICT GETS JOB FEW HOURS AFTER ARRIVAL

Thomas Delaney Asks For a Chance and Gets It.

Last night Thomas Delaney, ex-convict of Kingston penitentiary, walked in the office of The Advertiser and asked for an opportunity to place his case before the citizens of London. He wanted to lead a straight and honest life, but was homeless, penniless and friendless. Released last week, his efforts in Chatham, from where he was sentenced, to secure new employment, had been unavailing.

The Advertiser this morning published his story. Today he returned to the office and announced that he had secured employment with a local tailor. Delaney is a pantmaker by trade, and also used to work as an upholsterer.

Usually the chief concern of an ex-convict is to hide the fact that he has worn stripes. Ex-convicts know by experience how prone they are to receive the cold shoulder as soon as the story of their past leaks out. Delaney knew this, too, and that was why he came to The Advertiser and told his story.

Those who were willing to trust him would then have the opportunity to do so, and the publication of his story in the Advertiser would forestall possible loss of employment should his story be found out later.

## BUILDING INSPECTOR TO ADJUST DIFFICULTY

Will Settle Question of Side-walk Around Dominion Savings Building.

Charged with obstructing the street where the construction work of the Dominion Savings Building is being done, John Purdon, contractor, was in police court this morning. The charge was laid by Peter Philipin, organizer of the Carpenters' Union in this city. Although the city bylaw demands that a sidewalk be built around a fence enclosing such construction work, both the city engineer and Building Inspector Piper thought that a sidewalk should not be built in this instance on account of the narrowness of Richmond and King streets.

Mr. Purdon was convinced that he had been summoned by Peter Philipin through spite over carpenters' difficulties, although none of his men had asked for increased pay. "Several days ago I objected to striking carpenters calling my men mean names, while working on the building at Richmond and King streets. One of the strikers said 'We'll have you in court for blocking the street, then.'"

Philipin denied that the carpenters had anything to do with him laying the charge.

Since the action of Mr. Purdon in not building a sidewalk is contrary to the bylaw, even though the absence of a sidewalk was sanctioned by the city engineer, the case was adjourned for a week, the matter being left in the hands of Mr. Purdon and Building Inspector Piper for adjustment.
