CANADIANS TO BE TAUGHT TO USE BAYONETS

Second Contingent Will Devote More Time to This Than Shooting.

INSPIRES CONFIDENCE

And Training On Ranges Would Be Difficult in Winter Weather.

RECRUITING BEGINS SOON

No Definite Word Received as to Character of Force.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—The enlistment of the second Canadian expeditionary force probably will begin at the end of this week. There has been no definite word from the war office yet as to the character of the force which is desired. This will be a matter for discussion between Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes and Lord Kitchener when the former reaches London tomorrow.

The militia department is receiving an even greater flood of applications from volunteers in all parts of the country than were received for the first expeditionary force.

Plans for the training of the second force are already being perfected. The chief training which was given to the first force was in shooting, and it is planned to make the second expeditionary force as skilful in the use of the bayonet as the first was in shooting. It is recognized that a man trained in the use of the bayonet is one of the most formidable forces of the war. It has become apparent that the German foot soldiers are lacking both in drill with the bayonet and in taste for it. Time after time they are reported to have flinched from bayonet attacks and to have faltered when sent forward with bayonets to carry positions.

It is said that with competent instructors active men acquire great skill with the bayonet in a comparatively short time, and that once soldiers have acquired skill and the desire with the bayonet they find great satisfaction in using it, and have a sense of security which steadies them in the field.

William, the Assassin!

RUSSIANS AND THE ENEMY PREPARE FOR GREAT BATTLE

Scene of Conflict Is Likely To Be Between Sandomir and Ivangorod—Czar's Troops Are Eager To Engage the Foe.

London, Oct. 13.—All eyes today are turned to the eastward, where, under conditions of the utmost secrecy, the Teutonic allies and the Russians are preparing to engage in what may prove to be the most decisive combat of the war.

Evidence is accumulating to show that this gigantic conflict will be determined in Russian Poland, and the only question disturbing British experts is as to which side has chosen the battle ground.

Herlin admits having withdrawn from the Niemen River, and at the same time discounts the whole movement in that region as being of no strategic importance.

It is now clear that Russia has abandoned the narrow point in Galicia, between Przemyel and Cracow, Russian forces having been withdrawn from the area.

What may be the intention of the Russian retreat is anything in the nature of a question resulting from vigorous fighting.

Centre Important Point.

Whatever may be the intention of the Russian retreat, it is clear that the Russian army is operating on the ends of the great Russian battle front, it is clear that these movements have paved the way for a decisive battle.

Broadly speaking, this is now the position of the antagonists awaiting the word to open the engagement. The main battle will be fought on the line of the Niemen River.

BELGIAN GOVERNMENT TO BE TRANSFERRED TO HAVRE

Decision Made To Take It to France So As To Have Full Liberty of Action—King Stays With the Army.

Bordeaux, Oct. 13.—It has been decided to transfer the Belgian Government to France, in order that it may have full liberty of action.

The foregoing was announced officially in Bordeaux today.

Several Belgian ministers, accompanied by a group of officials, left Ostend this morning for Havre, where the French Government has prepared temporary offices for them.

King Albert remains at the head of the Belgian army.

FRENCH OFFICIAL STATEMENT REPORTS STEADY PROGRESS

(Canadian Press.)

Paris, Oct. 13.—3:08 p.m.—The following official announcement was given out in Paris this afternoon: "On our left wing our forces have resumed the offensive in the regions of Hazebrouck and of Bethune, against detachments of the enemy composed in large part of cavalry coming from the front along Bailleul, Estaires and La Bessee.

"The town of Lille, held by a territorial detachment, has been attacked and occupied by a German army corps.

"Between Arras and Albert we have made notable progress.

"On the centre also we have made progress in the region of Berry-au-Bac, and we have advanced toward Souain, in the west of the Argonne and north of Malancourt.

"Between the Argonne and the Meuse, on the right bank of the Meuse, our troops who hold the heights of the Meuse to the east of Verdun have advanced.

"To the south of the road from Verdun to Metz, in the region of Apremont, we have gained a little territory on our right, and repulsed a German attack on our left.

"On our right wing Vosges and Alsace there has been no change.

"To sum up, yesterday was marked by perceptible progress on the part of our forces in various points on the field of battle.

"In Galicia, the defeated Austrian corps are endeavoring to reform at a point four kilometres west of Przemyel."

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED IN BRITISH SOUTH AFRICA

Rebellion of Force Under Lt.-Col. Maritz, With Attempts of German Government To Spread Sedition, — Make Measure Necessary.

Cape Town, U. S. A., Oct. 13.—Via London, 11:27 a.m.—It has been officially announced here that a commando under Col. Maritz has rebelled in the northwest of the Cape Provinces.

Martial law has been proclaimed throughout the Union.

The proclamation imposing martial law follows: "Whereas, a state of war exists between the British Empire on the one hand and the German Empire on the other, and, whereas, the Government of the protectorate of German Southwest Africa, through a wide-spread secret propaganda, persistent endeavor to seduce citizens of the Union and officers and members of the defence forces of the Union from their allegiance, and to cause rebellion and civil war within the Union;

"And, whereas, the utmost efforts have so far succeeded that Lieut.-Col. Solomon Gerhartus Maritz, together with a number of his officers and a portion of the forces at his command, has shamefully and traitorously gone over to the enemy, and is now in open rebellion against the Government and the people of the Union, and is, in conjunction with forces of the enemy, invading the northern portion of the Cape province;

"And, whereas, there is grave reason to think that the Government of German Southwest Africa has through its numerous spies and agents, communicated with and corrupted also other citizens of the Union under the false and treacherous pretext of favoring the establishment of a republic in South Africa;

"The Government of the Union considers it necessary to take effective measures to protect and defend the interests of the Union and its loyal and law-abiding citizens against these insidious and treacherous attacks from within and without, and to that end to declare martial law."

The proclamation declares that the whole Union of South Africa is under martial law as understood and administered in time of war, and dating as from today.

The proclamation is signed by Lord Buxton, governor-general of the Union, and countersigned by General Smuts, minister of defence.

London Newspaperwoman Writes Gripping War Poem

DESERTED BABY BORN ON ROAD, IS STILL ALIVE

Fights Successful Battle For Unwelcome Little Life.

HOOR OLD WHEN FOUND

Police Investigate But Have No Clue to Mother, Who Threw Babe Into Gutter.

Born on the street and cast into the gutter to die, a male infant, only an hour old, found on York street, near Talbot street, last night, has fought a successful battle for its unlamentable little life at Victoria Hospital.

Doctors and police are puzzled at the case, which is the strangest one of child abandonment in the annals of the police department of London. Both are inclined to believe that the babe was born where it was found, but a young woman, passing along the north side of the street, found the tiny mite of humanity in the rain-washed gutter, nearly frozen. Carrying it to the office of Dr. George Wilson, they called the police.

Examination revealed the fact that the child was born without medical attendance, and that it was little more than an hour old. Exposure to rain and cold had almost accomplished the purpose of those who left it there, for the boy was still dead, but a wonderful spark of vitality remained in the tiny body, for, after it had been warmed and attended to by Dr. Wilson, it was sent to Victoria Hospital maternity ward and is now under the care of nurses.

The tiny spark of life, fanned by careful nursing and medical care, has made a wonderful response, for doctors now declare that the deserted newborn child will live.

Without any clue to work on the police are investigating the case, but so far nothing has been unearthed to reveal the identity of the heartless mother who threw the infant into the gutter.

Degradation of the most pronounced type, cruelty in one of its most revolting forms, and a woman's and child's almost unbelievable vitality, all figure in the case.

"The child was undoubtedly born on the street and left there to die," said George Wilson, the doctor, "but it is a miracle that it has managed to live, exposed as it was, to the rain and cold, beyond comprehension. The fact remains that it did."

SPECIAL MEDAL REQUIRED FOR THE ARTILLERY

V. C. Not Sufficient as Distinction, Says Colonel of Infantry.

WHOLE ARMY PRAISES

General Smith-Dorrien Unites With Others in Appreciating Work Done.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 13.—Dated September 27, a letter has been received in Halifax from an officer of high standing in the British army.

Just before writing he had conversed with an officer from the front. The following are extracts:

"The troops are having a very hard time, but very pleased with themselves. When we left our infantry had got within five hundred yards of the Germans, but could not get any further on account of barbed wire, etc. The whole country is a sea of liquid mud almost up to your knees. Our troops out there, he said, had the utmost contempt for the Germans, and looked on them like a lot of rabbits to be shot down whenever they appeared. He said that the whole army is singing the praises of the artillery, and thinks that there's nothing like them in the world. He met Gen. Smith-Dorrien, who said that the artillery was simply magnificent, and that no words of his could praise them enough. Apparently they saved the whole army during the retreat from Mons. If it had not been for the way the batteries were handled, the army would have been overwhelmed. An infantry colonel he met, who had been through the whole thing from the beginning to the end, said that the artillery should be given to the artillery, the artillery alone, and every officer, N. C. O. and man of the R. A. ought to be given the V.C. for the better and their position to the V.C. is not sufficient, it ought to be something apart from that."

CONFIRM ATROCITY STORY

English Women Caring for Nine Little Maimed Belgians.

Further confirmation of the stories of Belgian atrocities in Belgium has reached London from a rather indirect source. The information came to J. C. McDonald, manager of the Dundas and Talbot streets branch of the Bank of Toronto, through his sister, who is in Victoria, B. C.

A friend of the latter has received a letter from her sister in England saying that she is caring for sixteen Belgian children, refugees from the devastated districts, and that no less than nine of them have had their limbs amputated at the wrists.

That the information contained in the letter is reliable is vouched for by Mr. McDonald, who is personally acquainted with all the parties through whom it came eventually to him.
