WOODSTOCK BUT GARFIELD IS STILL AMONG THE

Official Executioner Strongly Advocates That All Condemned Men Be Confined in Provincial Prisons -Declares Escape Would Not Have Occurred If Such Procedure Was Followed.

[Special To The Advertiser.]

Woodstock, May 27 .- Arthur Ellis, official hangman, is in the city. In an interview with The Advertiser correspondent this afternoon, Canada's hangman stated that "all men under the sentence should be kept in provincial penitentiaries."

"Had Garfield been in Kingston he would never have escaped," tated Mr. Ellis. "I have always contended that county jails are not built or adapted for keeping condemned men, and Garfield's escape proves it. His escape was easy. If he had been in Kingston under proper guards no such thing would have happened. The transfer of condemned men to federal prisons would eliminate the sentiment that is created for convicted men by local conditions and people. Garfield would have been removed from all this sentiment that has been shown here."

Ellis visited Sheriff McGhee this afternoon. "It is not yet June 2," Ellis commented. "Garfield may be caught before that " Ellis came to Woodstock to erect the scaffold that Norman Garfield was to hang on. For the present at least Ellis' job has been postponed.


