There was a lot of discussion over the matter, and the resolution was finally supported and passed by the board on motion of Trustee

"I happen to know that the Roman Catholies have sent out a petition in Catholics have self-out by every one of them, and it will be sent to the Government," said Trustee Clark.

"They are trying to break the present law, and I move that we pass the resolution. Under the present law the Roman Catholics have more privileges here than in any other place in the

The resolution was passed by a vote of 19 to 1, one trustee not voting.


