

FISCAL SYSTEM OF BRITAIN NOT TO BE ALTERED

Premier Bonar Law Makes Announcement Regarding Policy.

SCORES LLOYD GEORGE

Declares Former Premier Indiscreet in Turkish Situation.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The opening of Parliament has been postponed from Nov. 20 to Nov. 23. The king will take part in the customary state ceremony.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The new government will make no fundamental changes in the fiscal system, according to Premier Bonar Law, speaking in London tonight. Neither does it intend any fundamental changes in the constitution of the House of Lords for the first three or four sessions of Parliament.

Mr. Law denied the implication in a speech by Austen Chamberlain that he (Law) was equally responsible with Lloyd George for the Near Eastern policy. In this connection he remarked on a speech by Lloyd George in August, which, he said, was so anti-Turkish that it was issued to the Greek army as an army order.

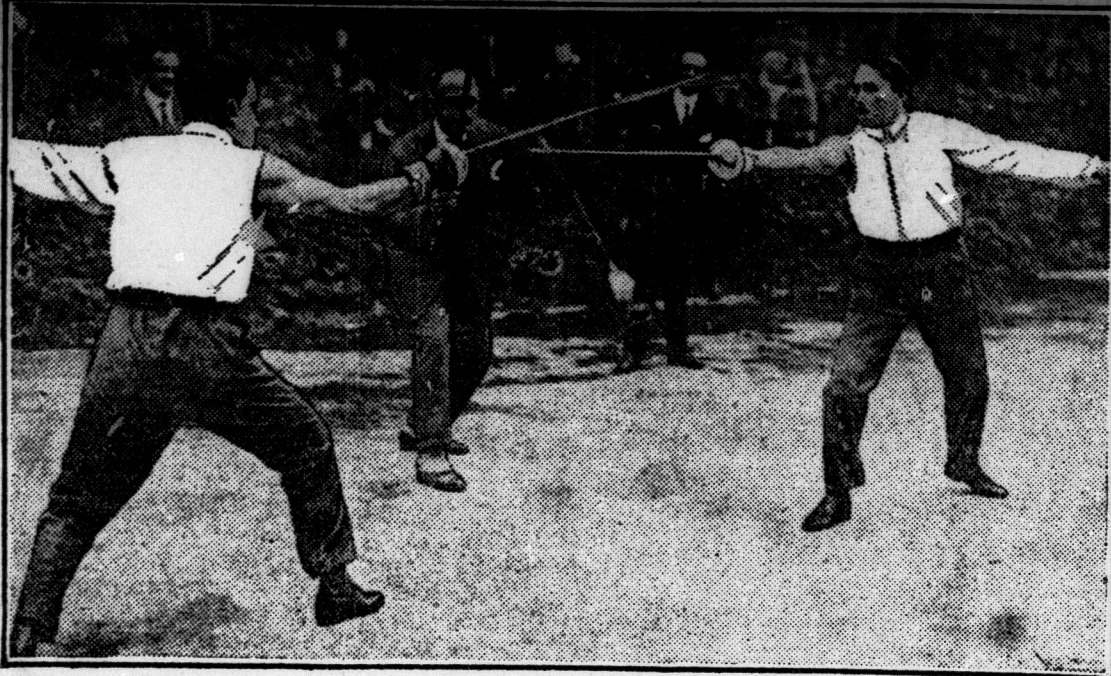
Referring to the former government's statement announcing an appeal to the dominions for assistance in the Near East, Bonar Law remarked: "When I read that manifesto I thought, and I said to a friend: 'It is utterly impossible that this or any government should have made such an appeal without previous confidential correspondence with the prime ministers of the dominions.' What was my amazement to find in a few days that not only had there been no such consultation with the dominions, but that this extraordinary manifesto had been issued with the knowledge of the cabinet, and that none of the others knew anything about it."

Scores Appeal to Dominions. The premier continued: "Just consider what that appeal to the dominions meant. The whole relationship of our empire is one of the most solemn things in connection with our whole social and political life. I believe I am right in saying that never in our history up to now had we suddenly thrown as a bolt from the blue this appeal for help when not one of the dominions had the remotest idea that there was any idea in the air, and when it was well known that their help could not come in time to be of any assistance in the crisis, was to risk, in my opinion, one of the greatest assets of the empire. It was to take a risk with our dominions which no wise man would have taken, and which I think was not more foolish than it was wrong."

Bonar Law also criticized Lloyd George for attacking both the Turks and the Persians on the eve of the conference with the Turks, remarking, incidentally, however, that "though at present I am fighting Lloyd George I hope when it is all over that we shall continue to be friends."

Referring to the criticism regarding the number of peers in the cabinet, Mr. Bonar Law pointed out that there was only one peer in his cabinet than there was in Lloyd George's cabinet.

Alluding to the suggestions that

his policy was that of going to sleep, the premier said that no criticism of that kind was going to deflect him in the slightest degree from what he believed the country wanted.

Dealing with the condition of agriculture, Mr. Law said he was afraid they were coming into conditions almost as bad as prevailed in the eighties. All he could say was that the government would go into the matter carefully, and try to find some scheme which would enable agriculture to help itself, for it was not a fatal thing and would really could get on a sound basis.

While the premier was referring to the unemployment situation the sound of hundreds of men outside the building singing "The Red Flag" and cheering could be clearly heard. A force of mounted and foot police were kept busy moving the demonstrators away.

Must Work in Harmony. Proceeding the speaker declared that if he thought the Unionist party was, or ever would become a party of reaction he would not be a member of it. It was quite true that by natural force of gravity, reactionary people belonged to that party because they had nowhere else to go, but it would be a fatal thing and would never happen while he was leader, for that section to become a dominating factor.

Referring to the question of Mesopotamia and Palestine, the premier said: "I wish we had never gone there. A nation with our traditions and our sense of duty, and which we have incurred, but that does not mean that I admit we have obligations which will keep us there. I saw the suggestion made by someone else, I think by Lord Grey, that these were subjects where we might with advantage consult our dominions. I think it a good idea and will certainly give it careful consideration. The foreign policy generally is in a very serious position. Things in Constantinople have become very serious again. The key of the situation in the Near East is not in Constantinople but in London, Paris and Rome. The keynote of our policy is that we must work in harmony with our allies. We are trying to do that."

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Mr. Law denied Conservative hostility to the trades unions and condemned legislation which would unduly tend to restrict the entry of labor into parliament, which was a bad effect to the nation that labor should work constitutionally and not by underground methods.

Dealing with the question of the house of lords reform, the premier said he did not dream of bringing a

Plan To Extend Wireless Stations Up Into Arctic Circle.

EDMONTON, Nov. 7.—Federal plans for a chain of wireless stations extending right into the Arctic circle are being completed. The stations will be operated by the Dominion government with the primary purpose of keeping federal officials in touch with one another.

The locations for the proposed stations are Fort Smith, Resolution, Simpson, Norman and the sixth at Dawson City.

great constitutional question like that into the arena at present, but they must, if the opportunity seemed suitable, try to deal with it, and he would try to bring about a change by general agreement. The government certainly would not make any purely partisan move. He would not try to bring about a change by a momentary act of simply repealing the parliament act and leaving things exactly as they were before.

Referring finally to tariff reform, Mr. Law said that just because he thought any violent change had at the present time the new parliament would not make any fundamental change in the fiscal system. The way in which the exchanges of the world were going had altered the position entirely. Moreover, at a period when security and confidence were mainly wanted, any advantage they would get from changing their system would not be as great as the disadvantage from the disturbance it would cause. The premier concluded by saying he really had no doubt that the government would have a majority at the end of this election.

INDIANS STRIVE TO REMOVE FRICTION

Invite Hon. Charles Stewart To Attend Council Meeting.

Special to The Advertiser. OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—Chiefs of the Six Nations of the Tuscarora Reservation in council passed a special invitation to Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior in the King's government, and superintendent-general of Indian affairs, to come to their council meeting, Nov. 21, in an attempt to relieve the friction which exists between the Six Nations and the department of Indian affairs.

The following letter has been forwarded to the minister: "Hon. Charles Stewart, Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, Ottawa, Ont. 'In further reference to our verbal promise made on the 6th of October last, at the time of your visit to our fair, that you would be pleased to give us two days in November for a conference with the hope of coming to an amicable settlement as to our trouble, we beg to communicate the following decision of the chiefs in council at their meeting on Tuesday.

"The council decides to respectfully ask the Hon. Charles Stewart, superintendent-general of Indian affairs, to visit the Grand River band on the 21st of November next for the sole purpose of coming to some arrangement as to the trouble between the department of Indian affairs and the Six Nations.

"We are, sir, your obedient servants."

"Art. Anderson, secretary of the Six Nations council."

TRAVERSES O.T.A. CHARGE AGAINST SARNIA MAN

GETS STIFF FINE AND JAIL TERM

Logan Man Found Guilty of Two Breaches of O. T. A.

STRAFFORD, Nov. 7.—For having liquor for sale in other than a private residence, W. M. Bannan of Logan, in police court this morning was fined \$1,000 and three months in jail, with an additional jail term, not exceeding three months, if the fine is not paid.

On a second conviction of keeping liquor for sale, he was fined \$1,000, or in default of payment, six months in jail, sentence to commence at the expiration of the first term.

Magistrate Makins in passing sentence said that fines meted out in the past did not seem to have had much effect on the accused, but for the consideration he felt for the man's family he would have felt it his duty to impose the maximum penalty.

DELAY PASSING OF BIANCHI SENTENCE

Slayer of William Fraser Too Weak To Leave Cell.

Special to The Advertiser. WINDSOR, Nov. 7.—Frank Bianchi, adjudged guilty of the crime of murder, must spend a day or two longer, perhaps more, in his steel-barred cell at Sandwich, before he hears from the lips of Justice Lennox the words that will sentence him to the gallows.

Bianchi's attempt last week to be his own executioner was nearly successful. He lost so much blood from self-inflicted wounds in his arm, that he is still very weak and unable to be taken from his cell into the courtroom. As soon as this can be done with safety he will be escorted before Justice Lennox and supported by deputies until the fatal words are spoken, when he will be taken back to his cell, there to remain until the day of execution.

Bianchi, to jail officials, has several times expressed his horror of death. It is feared that he may succumb before the date of his execution arrives.

While no death watch will be placed before his cell door until he has been sentenced to die, a jail guard now remains there constantly to see that the prisoner does himself no further harm.

JOINS MISS MACSWINEY ON HER HUNGER STRIKE

DUBLIN, Nov. 7.—The other woman arrested the same day as Miss Mary MacSwiney, joined today in her hunger-strike at Mount Joy prison. Miss MacSwiney was brought back weak after her exercise today, and requested that she might be permitted to see Dr. Kathleen Lynn, but the application was refused.

ANNOUNCE TWO JUDICIAL APPOINTMENTS IN QUEBEC

The vacancy caused by the resignation of Justice Archibald as chief justice of the superior court, Montreal, has been filled by the appointment of Justice J. E. Martin of the court of king's bench as acting chief justice of the superior court.

Special to The Advertiser. EDMONTON, Nov. 7.—Honeymooning on a whaleboat, receiving Eskimos and Houcheux Indians, and dining daily on fish and caribou, is the life of one of the missionary brides. Mrs. W. Crissall, formerly Miss A. Perry, fresh from her Toronto home. Her husband is Rev. W. Crissall of the Anglican Mission at Fort McPherson. The Crissalls were married early this summer in Edmonton. The Arctic apparently has claimed Mrs. Crissall for its own, and that she is entering wholeheartedly into her new sphere is evidenced by a glimpse of the missionary honeymooners brought to Edmonton by the crew of the Lady Mackenzie, the last boat to leave the Mackenzie delta for the south.

When the Macworth was at Akla-vik the Crissalls arrived at the delta post in a heavy whaleboat, having sealed their craft to the mouth of the big river and across to Herschell Island, where a "dead" engine was shipped out for repairs. The "dead" couple put out for Shingle Point to conduct funeral services for an Eskimo family.

On Saturday evening earlier in the season the crew of the Mackworth had another illuminating glimpse of these workers in the north. It was dusk, a cold, soaking rain was falling. A chill wind from the Arctic swept the river stretches of the Far North.

"Thanks so much, but I think we had better be getting on or we may not be at camp in time for church," said the bride, and the "honeymoon" was over.

So once more the clergyman put his shoulder to the tracking line, his hand grasped the slippery steering gear, and the "honeymoon" disappeared into the gloom to travel all night in order that their Indians might not miss their Sunday services. Of such is the Christianity of the Far North.

PREDICTS U. F. O. TO HOE ITS OWN ROW

R. H. Halbert Declares There Is No Danger of Fusion Being Consummated.

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—The Globe tomorrow will publish the following regarding the action it is expected delegations of the United Farmers of Ontario will take at the Progressive conference in Winnipeg on Friday.

"The United Farmers of Ontario intend to 'hoe their own row' in federal politics. The executive of the movement is as strongly opposed to the fusion of the U. F. O. with the Progressive party as it is to broadening circles. At the Progressive conference in Winnipeg on Friday it is believed the members of the Ontario contingent will vote solidly against any proposition leading to a re-alignment as far as their party is concerned."

"The Ontario members left for the West tonight. Each one had received a copy of a resolution passed by the executive. More than six expressed the opinion that the interests of agriculture will be served best by the farmer group maintaining its identity."

"Although the members, as usual, were reticent about talking for publication, it is believed they all share the opinion that the U. F. O. is convinced that 'the farmers must hoe their own row and hoe it clean.' He believes that on this subject the Ontario group will be unanimous."

"Mr. Halbert and all the other members refused to discuss their attitude toward Hon. T. A. Cregar. They expressed satisfaction with the results of the last session, and were of the opinion that it would not be wise to disturb the alignments of the various parties at Ottawa."

GLENCOE TESTS NEW MOTOR FIRE ENGINE

Department Has Stream Playing in Three and One-Half Minutes in Trial Run.

Special to The Advertiser. GLENCOE, Nov. 7.—Glencoe's new fire engine arrived last Monday and was given a thorough test on Tuesday by the Glencoe firemen. The engine, which is motor, was driven by Engineer Jack MacCracken from the fire hall to a tank near the high school, a distance of seven blocks, turning two corners, attaching a length of hose, attaching the suction hose and placing same in tank under the management of Fire Chief John W. Smith. In three and one-half minutes with a stream of water playing on a building. The trip was timed under a stop-watch by Councilor Parrott. The engine carries long extension and roof ladders and the other necessary equipment along with 1,000 feet of hose. There is also a trailer attached behind containing two tanks of 40 gallons each for chemicals. The fire company has placed the old engine and equipment in the old powerhouse in the south end of the town, and is arranging to place a fire alarm on one of the church bells for that section.

The council is placing several new cement water tanks underground for water supply, and along with the present tanks and equipment Glencoe is well fitted with fire protection.

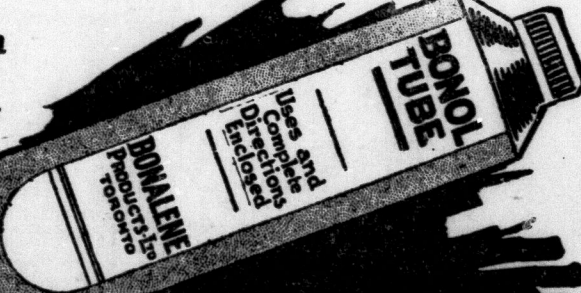

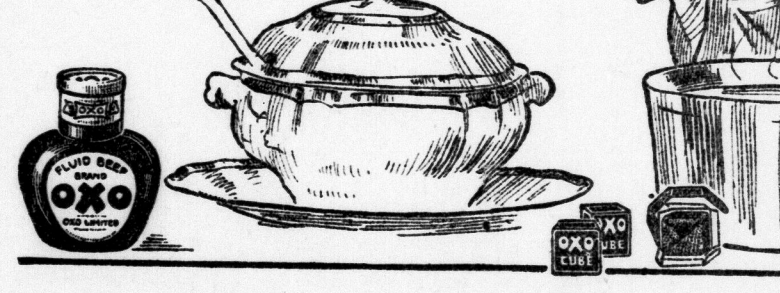
