WON'T HAVE THE FEES.

BUSINESS AT THE SCHOOL BOARD LAST NIGHT.

Collegiate Institute Fees Voted Down—Still No Action on the New Colborne Street School Building—Jailors' Salaries Talked Of—Promotion Regulations.

The Board of Education met last evening. The members present were Messrs. McRobert (Chairman), Dr. Campbell, Dr. Wilson, Turner, Blackwell, Sanders, Martyn, Greenless, Wilkins, Johnson, Anderson, Craig, Murphy, Griffin, Alexander, Jeffery, Powell, Stephenson, Secretary McElheran, Inspector Carson and Principal Merchant.

City Engineer Graydon made the report asked for upon Inspector Perry's report in re the Colborne Street School building. The Engineer declined to make a detailed report, but said that Inspector Perry's estimate was much too low. Any expenditure upon the present building would be inadequate to the results received. The building was lacking in every sanitary point of view, and was thoroughly wanting in every respect in modern school architecture, and very much out of repair.

In this connection the resolution of the Real Estate Owners, expressing the opinion that no new school should be built, was read.

Mr. Griffin moved that a committee of the Board be appointed to await on the City Council and ask that debentures to the extent of \$20,000 be issued for the new school building.

Mr. Greenless moved that the repairs reported by Mr. Perry be carried out, with the exception of the under-planning, furnaces and board ceilings. Mr. Wilkins seconded.

Mr. Craig moved in amendment that the matter be laid over for one month. If the Board should spend money upon the old building the result might not be satisfactory. Money had already been spent upon the present building, and it would now be difficult to tell where.

Mr. Griffin withdrew his motion in favor of Mr. Craig's resolution.

Mr. Greenless pointed out that the average attendance at the Colborne street school in the past year had been as good or better than other newer schools. So if the school was so very unhealthy, as claimed, the attendance would not be so good as it is.

Mr. Griffin said the school was crowded, and every day ratepayers came to him and said they wanted a new school.

Mr. Anderson said if a new school should be built, it should be away below the tracks. No man at the Board would pull down the school building, if it was his own dwelling.

Mr. Blackwell drew attention to the resolution of the R. E. O. P. A., and said that it should receive consideration.

Mr. Craig objected to the proposal to leave out furnaces, which were the most important needed improvement.

The amendment was lost. So was the motion.

On the years and days being called for, the amendment to lay the matter over was carried by 8 to 7.

Cardinal Grant asked the Board to use some "motives" to keep school children off the grass at Victoria Park. Filed.

Misses Laura Cooper and Mabel Canon asked for appointment as kindergarten directors, and Miss McKenzie asked for some supplies. No 1.

A. Accounts were received and referred to committees.

Principal Merchant reported an average attendance of 518; total on roll, 567; increase in average over April, 1893, 113. A large plot at the Institute grounds required seeding and sodding. No 2.

In this connection Mr. Jeffery took occasion to refute a statement made by Ald. J. W. Jones at the Council Board that the cost per pupil at the Collegiate Institute was \$50 per pupil. Mr. Jeffery said the cost per pupil was \$23.80 and he defied anyone to prove to the contrary. It was ridiculous for people professing to have knowledge of matters of finance to try to cast such slanders on the Board.

The motion was lost on the following vote:—

Mr. Blackwell also moved that some trees and shrubs be procured for Rectory Street School grounds. Lost.

Dr. Campbell suggested that No. 2 Committee be instructed to have trees planted about the different schools on Arbor Day where necessary. Lost. Adjourned.

CANADIAN CATTLE.

Correspondence on the Subject Brought Down—Mr. Nocard's Opinion.

London, May 1.—The Board of Husbandry issued today the correspondence which has been exchanged between the Colonial office and the Board of Husbandry in regard to the admission of Canadian cattle into Great Britain. The last letter from the Marquis of Ripon, the Colonial Secretary, is dated last Thursday and reviews the arguments of the Board of Husbandry in support of the slaughter of Canadian cattle. The Marquis then quotes the report of M. Nocard, the expert in cattle disease, in which he gives the result of his examination of lungs of American cattle supposed to be suffering from pleuro-pneumonia and imported into France. M. Nocard is quoted as saying that what is known in the Western parts of America as "constalk disease," has been mistaken for pleuro-pneumonia.

In September M. Nocard, in the report made to Sir Charles Tupper, declared that he had identified the lesions in lungs of Canadian cattle, which had been submitted to him with this disease. The report concludes by saying that as importation of store cattle does not begin until July, the Marquis hopes the Board's special examinations will be concluded by the middle of June, so as not to interfere with trade if no suspicious cases are found.
