

Strong guards of police, were stationed in the vicinity of the gunshops, and wherever it is possible to obtain firearms, and are doing the utmost to keep the turbulent mob in motion. The report of the murderous conspiracy terribly earaged the McCarthyites, who threatened to cast aside even the slight restraint which they have thus far put upon themselves and

Riveal meetings of Parnellites and anti-Parnellites, this evening, were separated by an enormous array of military and polices, and disorder thereby prevented.
