This route is in some respects the best that can be suggested. The only objection to it is that its terminus is in territory over which the United States now exercises jurisdiction. The route from Telegraph Creek on the Stickeen to Lake Teslin involves a longer overland journey, but has the advantage of being an all British route. At present the course taken by the trail is somewhat roundabout: but the government is expecting at any day to be put in possession of a report as to a more direct line. If this is favor able, the government is prepared to open the trail and, if the appropriation made at the last session is not sufficient to spend what is necessary and trust t the legislature to sanction the outlay.
