

MR. TURNER'S TOUR.

The visit of the Premier to the Mainland is unquestionably having the effect of placing the politics of British Columbia in a very much higher plane than they have hitherto occupied. He discusses the various public questions involved in our politics with much clearness and force, thereby showing the people that there is more to be thought about than the cheap gossip and vague insinuations in which the opposition press have indulged. This is certainly a subject for congratulation, because the whole effort of the opposition has been to make it appear to the electors that the gentlemen in charge of affairs are simply discharging their duties in a perfunctory way, being more concerned about how to feather their own nests and those of their friends than the welfare of the province. The Premier is showing the people of the interior that many very important questions have been dealt with intelligently by the government and the legislature, and we have no doubt that his exposition of matters in the nature of a revelation to a great many of those who hear him. He is making friends wherever he goes and his tour will strengthen the cause of the government more than even his warmest friends anticipate.

A FRUITFUL POLICY.

The Columbian says that the government's railway policy "produces no railways." The Colonist does not keep track of the Columbian's news columns, and so is unable to say whether it has suppressed the very important information published in other British Columbia papers, showing that work is being pushed with all possible speed upon the line from Robson to Midway; that contracts are being let and supplies are being forwarded for the line between Penticton and Midway; that an engineering party is about to start out to survey the line through the Hope mountains; that the contract has been signed for the construction of the line from the Coast to Chilliwack; that the contract has been signed for the immediate construction of the wagon road from the Stikine to Lake Teslin in connection with the railway from the Coast to the lake and that the railway will be pushed through just as soon as the Dominion government is heard from. To most people this would seem a pretty good showing. Even the News-Advertiser finds itself forced to admit that the line for section of the Coast-Kootenay road between Penticton and Robson will be pushed through without delay. How can the Columbian hope to retain even the semblance of respectability when it deliberately perverts the truth as it does in the language above quoted?

The New Westminster paper will not surely claim that the lines now actually under construction are not due to the railway policy of the government. Here is a proposition which cannot be gainsaid: By the fall of 1899 a railway line will be in operation from the Crow's Nest Pass to Penticton through the great quartz region of British Columbia, and this line will be due to the railway policy of the government of British Columbia. The Crow's Nest Pass road is due to the policy which led to the subsidizing of the British Columbia Southern. This charter was acquired by the Canadian Pacific, and the land subsidy made that company feel warranted in accepting the cash subsidy offered by the Dominion and building the road. There was no other subsidy for the line from Robson to Midway than that offered by the province, and this was sufficient to lead the Canadian Pacific, which had purchased the Columbian & Western charter, to undertake to build the road without any Dominion assistance. If it had not been for the existence of this subsidy, the Canadian Pacific would not have undertaken to build the line without asking anything from the Dominion, in which case Mr. Corbin would have doubtless obtained the charter sought by him, and would have diverted the business of the Boundary to Spokane. The line from Penticton to Midway is being built under the Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern charter, and not a shovelful of earth would have been turned upon it, if the province had not given a subsidy. The line to Chilliwack is under contract and to the same company, which receives no aid other than that which the province gives. Yet in the face of these things the Columbian says that the railway policy of the government "produces no railways."

THE CLAIMS OF THE PROVINCE.

In the course of his speech at Chilliwack, Mr. Turner laid stress upon the necessity for presenting the claims of British Columbia to the Ottawa government. It is a singular thing that as yet no opposition speaker and no opposition newspaper has referred to this subject, with the exception of the Times, and that paper did so to express the hope that the movement to secure fair play for the province would utterly fail. The movement will not fail, but will gain greater force than ever by the verdict of the people in support of the present provincial ministry. It is idle to pretend, as some do, that there is no use in opening this question of fair play. We saw the other day how that parliament voted a large sum of money—the principal and interest amounting to nearly half a million dollars—to pay the cost of the parliament buildings at Winnipeg. We understand quite well the argument used to justify this exceptional application of federal revenue. It was that Manitoba was created a province by the Dominion, and had at the time of its creation, of course, no public buildings, whereas the other provinces

prairie province on a footing with the others, it was right that the cost of its public buildings should be borne by the whole Dominion. This is an argument which breaks down at its most vital point, because it nowhere appears that the cost of the provincial buildings in the other provinces was borne by the whole Dominion or was taken into consideration, even remotely, in settling the terms of union. The only justification for the exceptional grant to Manitoba is that in the opinion of the ministry a case was made out showing that Manitoba had not received its full due from the federal government. Whatever the reasons may have been, the grant shows that on the making out of a case for exceptional treatment the federal government stands ready to ask parliament to accord it to any of the provinces. When we say "exceptional treatment" we do not wish to imply that there is no merit in the claim of Manitoba that has been recognized in the manner above mentioned, but simply treatment which is not uniformly extended to all the provinces and is supported by the existence of exceptional circumstances in the province receiving it. This principle has been recognized in more than one instance, but the case of Manitoba is the most recent and, by reason of the nature of the vote, the most conspicuous. It gives those in British Columbia, who are advocating the submission of a case from this province showing that we are entitled to more liberal dealing than we have hitherto received, very great encouragement. We have better reason than ever to think that, if a united province insists upon its claims being recognized at Ottawa, they will be recognized. The action of the federal ministry in respect to Manitoba is the strongest incentive that could be asked for the presentation of the claim of British Columbia for fair play.

THE CREDIT OF THE PROVINCE.

In his speech at Chilliwack, Mr. Turner brought out some facts in regard to the provincial credit that are worthy of being kept before the public. As we pointed out yesterday, one of the planks of the government is the maintenance of the provincial credit at its present high standard, and Colonist readers have seen how the opposition press has sought to create the impression that the province was without standing in the London money market. They have gone even further, and substantially contended that it ought to be without standing because the objects for which money was borrowed and the manner in which it was used were both utterly unwarranted. Mr. Turner was able at Chilliwack to show a very remarkable condition of things in regard to our provincial securities, viz., that between 1891 and 1895 British Columbia securities had advanced in price more rapidly than Imperial consols. The increase in the former case being 10½ per cent, and in the latter 7½ per cent. The showing up to date is equally satisfactory, consols having advanced from 1891 to the present time 12 per cent., while British Columbia three per cent. inscribed stock has advanced 19 per cent. It is true that the consols bear only 2½ per cent, as against three per cent. for British Columbia securities, but, on the other hand, it is to be remembered that they form the most approved security in the world, and we are not contrasting the price of consols with British Columbia stock, but simply the relative rates of increase in price. If, as the opposition allege, our inscribed stock has gone up in price only because money is cheaper now than it was in 1891, consols ought to have advanced in the same ratio; but as our stock has gained greater proportionately the conclusion is irresistible that the credit of the province has advanced. Admitting that the gain of 12 per cent. in the value of consols represents the cheapening of money during the last seven years, if British Columbia securities had advanced only 12 per cent. the gain might be accounted for by the plethora of money seeking investment, although it would be unreasonable to expect that provincial securities would feel the effect of an easier money market as speedily as Imperial securities. However, for the sake of argument, let 12 per cent. of the increase in the price of British Columbia three per cent. assigned to the cheapening of money in London. There remains seven per cent. increase to be accounted for, and this can only be explained by the assumption that during the last seven years the relative value of provincial securities has advanced. Now, if the relative value of the securities of a country advance, the inference is that the credit of the country has improved. This improvement, we frankly concede, is due in a great measure to the development of the province, but the London money market is very closely in touch with the borrowing communities everywhere, and if it were true, as the opposition allege, that our financial affairs are being badly handled and the credit of the country was being destroyed by the imposition of excessive burdens upon the people, we may be very sure that the London money market would have reflected such a condition of things. The financial press of London is as eager to ascertain the news of the financial world as are the ordinary daily papers here. If the course of the government in asking the house to vote such a subsidy receives the approval of the electors by the return of the Hon. Mr. Turner's ministry to power, the Dominion authorities will be quick to recognize the necessity for doing their share toward this construction of that great public work. But if on the contrary the government should be defeated, Sir Wilfrid Laurier would quite naturally conclude that the people of this province were not in accord with the Hon. Mr. Turner as to the desirability of constructing a road from a British Columbia seaport to Yukon waters, and would act accordingly.

MR. MARTIN AT CHILLIWACK.

Mr. Joseph Martin went to Chilliwack, spoke and came back again. His party would have been stronger in that riding if he had stayed away in the first place. The Nelson Tribune reviews the political situation as follows: It thinks Victoria will go solid for the government. It believes that Nanaimo City and North Victoria will be opposition, that Mr. Higgins may possibly be elected in Esquimalt and the other cities of the island will go for the government. That is, of the fourteen seats on Vancouver Island it gives the government eleven. It gives the opposition one in Cariboo and the government one, and thinks the Lillooets are in doubt. It gives the two seats in Cassiar to the government, and one of the three Yale seats to the same party. It expects the opposition to carry the whole Westminister district and to get one seat in East Kootenay and all four of the seats in West Kootenay and in Vancouver; that is to say, our contemporary admits that the government has sixteen seats certain with a chance of one additional seat in Cariboo, two in Lillooet and one in Esquimalt, which would bring the total to twenty, or a majority of one. The suggestion that the opposition will carry Nanaimo and North Victoria is rather amusing to those who understand the political situation on this island. The Tribune's forecast in West Kootenay, Vancouver, Richmond, Cariboo and the lower Fraser, is simply a guess. North of the Fraser, which the Tribune states will give the opposition a substantial majority, is reported on excellent authority to be perfectly safe for the government, and there is no reason to imagine that there will be any change in Lillooet. The Colonist adheres to its proposition made a week ago, that in a house of thirty-eight members the opposition will have fewer votes than they had in a house of thirty-three.
