"The sentence passed upon Bressi, the assassin of King Humbert, means one assassin of King Humbert, means one year of solitary confinement in a secret cell 6 feet long by 3 feet wide, dark, a plank for a bed, and bread and water once in 24 hours as diet. Absolute silence is enforced. If he breaks the rule he is placed in a straight-jacket, in irons or in the straight bed. The year must be spent also without work, books, writing materials or tobacco. Few prisoners complete a year of solitude. They go mad or die. Should Bressi live and retain reason, he will be placed at work in prison."
