**A SUMMER PARADISE**

**NEW TRAINS ON THE I.C.R. THIS WEEK**

As a result of the ever increasing traffic to summer resorts on the St. Lawrence River, the new management of the Intercolonial Railways have determined to put on another train to take care of this business. The train will be known as the "St. Lawrence Special." It will make its initial trip out of Montreal on Friday, leaving Bonaventure Station at 8.45 p.m.

H. H. Melanson, general passenger agent at Moncton arrived in Montreal this morning to complete arrangements for the new train.

Mr. Melanson said, in discussing traffic that the business this year had been heavier than ever before and declared that the I.C.R. was hauling more passengers out of Montreal to Atlantic resorts than any other year. He said it had been necessary for some time past to run the Ocean Limited out of Montreal during the week ends in two sections. It has been found, however, that even this did not handle the traffic satisfactorily, with the result that a new train was decided upon.

The St. Lawrence Special will be a solid Pullman train and will take care of the week ends to Quebec, Riviere Ouelle, Murray Bay, Riviere du Loup, Cacouna, Ste. Flavie, Metis Beach and Matane.

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
