To All Consumers of Electrical Current

In the matter of the Power Controller dated May 1st, 1918, The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, in pursuance of the said order of the Power Controller, hereby order and direct that no Municipality, Commission, Company or person using electrical current supplied by the Hydro Electric Power Commission shall permit any electric lights to be fixed, arranged or used at any time in any store, either with or without reflectors, in such a manner as to direct or throw light into the store windows, nor any part of the store used for the purpose of displaying commodities to passers-by on the streets on which stores face. And it is further ordered that no greater amount of electrical energy be used in stores or other buildings than is absolutely necessary to supply the lighting to enable business to be properly carried on in said stores or buildings. And it is further ordered that this order is to become effective on the 10th day of May, 1918, and remain in force until further notice.

And it is further ordered that any municipality, company, commission or person purchasing, consuming or using electrical current, violating or infringing any provision of the Power Controller or of this order shall be liable to the penalty prescribed in the order of the Power Controller, of May 1st, 1918, and the said penalty may be recoverable or enforced by summary proceedings and conviction under the proceedings of Part XV. of the Criminal Code.

Steel Armed Cavalry

Recruits are urgently needed for Steel Armed Cavalry for immediate Service at the Front.

They must be Category "A" 2 men, 5 foot 7 inches in height, accustomed to horses and good riders.

Men who are in class I of the Military Service Act are not to be accepted for this Service.

Steel Armed Cavalry are armed with a sword and trained for "Shock action."

This is to differentiate them between this Arm of the Service and Mounted Rifles.

If they are found "fit" by the Medical Board in London, they will be sent to the Depot Squadron, Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto, Ont.
