The Montreal daily Star of the 9th instant says: "The crop of apples from the West this season is exceptionally heavy. Three millions which would have been sent to Montreal are now being carried to other parts of the country."

The point in the above which we wish to call attention to is the exceedingly cheap rate of freight mentioned. According to this statement apples are now being carried from Montreal to the English market at two shillings per barrel, while it is costing the fruit-growers of this valley something like five shillings to send them from Halifax to the same market.

Information was received from Zanesville, Ohio, last week, that the death of his eldest son, Parker N., which occurred at that place on Saturday, 13th inst., was due to cancer of the throat. The deceased left his native home about twenty-three years ago, and after visiting different places in the United States, he finally settled in Zanesville, where he was employed in a railway office for quite a long time.

Safe Cracking at Weymouth Bridge. About 2 o'clock, on Tuesday morning, the safe of Douglas Campbell, at Weymouth Bridge, was broken into, and the vault of the safe and the iron cash box blown open. The thieves secured \$35.00 in cash and 3 or 4 revolvers. Entrance to the store was effected by breaking down the door, which was done by the explosion of a dynamite charge.

Among the native population of China there is not the best of feeling toward foreign residents, even in the most peaceable times. Should the power of the central government be overthrown, or for the time rendered powerless, every foreign resident in China would be in imminent danger from the fanatical mobs of Chinese. To guard against anything of the kind the great powers have made ample provision by sending strong naval reinforcements to the scene of the conflict.

Yemen. We are led to indulge in the above reflections by observing in a late issue of the Yarmouth paper a lengthy article solemnly describing something which appears to us to be not only new but strangely startling. This is nothing less than a scheme for constructing an electric railway from Yarmouth, N. S. to St. John, N. B., around the head of the Bay of Fundy.

Now that the fruit crop is nearly all gathered, our farmers are discovering that the yield is much larger than was estimated a few weeks ago. Taking the valley as a whole the crop is away above the average, and not very far short of one of the best years. The fruit this year is reported to be very free from defects, through the reason that the quantity of refuse being less than usual: all of which, added to the fact that prices are likely to prove fairly good in the English market, is extremely gratifying.

The Bridgetown Driving Park Co. Limited.

Up to the present time we have refrained from saying anything concerning a driving track for this town, from the fact that up to last Monday evening the matter had been entirely speculative. To-day, however, we are in a position to announce that a number of our leading citizens have liberally subscribed towards the movement, and a provisional board of directors chosen, and all other preliminary arrangements effected for the immediate grading of the track, which is to be accomplished under the supervision of Hector MacLean, Esq., a gentleman of vast experience in such matters, and who will perform the work in a most thorough and painstaking manner.

The plan of the track was made by R. J. Unalack, Esq., of Annapolis, who unhesitatingly states that there is no better location for the track than the one which he has laid out, and that the land directly back of the restaurant, on the corner of the street, and within two minutes' walk from the centre of the town and all the hotels.

The construction of the new building on the land owned by the Municipality of Annapolis, on the Church road leading from the town, has been rapidly advanced since the turning of the first soil a few weeks ago, and the intention of the building committee is carried out from this time forward, the building will witness its entire completion.
