### HEALTH AND HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Court plaster should never be applied to a bruised wound.

A very fine steel pen is best for marking with indelible ink.

" Sweet oil will renew patent leather tips. Rub over surface with bit of cotton batting dipped in the oil.

Corks may be made air and water tight by keeping them for five minutes entirely immersed in melted paraffine.

If a shirt bosom or any other article has been scorched in ironing lay it where the bright sunshine will fall directly on it.

Some cooks add to the water in which rice is to boiled the juice of a lemon. It is said to whiten, lighten and separate the grains.

To take the brown discolorations off cups in which custards are baked rub with damp flannel dipped in whiting. Scouring sand or sand soap will answer the purpose.

A good substitute for real oyster is made hy cutting the veal into small squares, dipping them into batter and frying in hot lard. They are served with cayenne pepper and salt, and should be eaten while hot.

Peach short cake is as good as strawberry, "it you only think so," as the dry-goods salesinan said when he offered blue cashmere to the woman who asked for green, and sliced peaches between layers of cake are very nice, especially if eaten with whipped cream.

The following dry process of cleaning kid gloves has been found satisfactory: Prepare a generous quantity of cracker crumbs; button the gloves upon the hands and rub with the crumbs. This process is especially efficacious in cleansing those of light undressed kid.

If one cannot have hot and cold water in one's room, one may at least, bytaking a little trouble, have only boiled water in the wash pitcher. It need not be warm, but it should once have been so. Only those who have tried it know what a difference there is in its softness, and how good it is for the skin.

To enjoy perfect refreshing sleep one should sleep in the dark. The sweetest and most undisturbed sleep is always enjoyed in a darkened room. Light acts upon the brain and those who sleep with their blinds up will find that in the summer time when so few hours are really dark, their sleep is not refreshing.

Backwoods Pie.—A backwoods pie is very simple, but not to be despised. To make it, grate a coffee cupful of maple sugar, beat up with two eggs and a little salt, and add enough cream to fill a pre plate lined with crust. Bake until the top of the custard puffs and seems on the point of crusting.

Indian Suet Pudding.—One-half pound suet, chopped fine; one cup inclasses, one pint milk, one egg, meal to make a very thin batter, teaspoonful ground cloves, teaspoonful ground cinnamon, one teaspoonful salt, a little nutnieg, a lew currants or chopped raisins. Boil or steam three hours. Serve with sauce.

Ginger Biscuits .- One pound of flour, half a pound of crushed loaf sugar, a teaspoonful of carbonate of soda, and a good tablespoonful of ground ginger. Mix all the dry ingredients together first, and then rub in half a make a stiff paste; roll out on a floured board, and cut the paste into small cakes. Bake for half an hour in rather a quick oven.

Bread Omelet. - Housekeepers who have too much principle to throw away stale bread, and who cannot bring their families to relish loaves pudding, will find they can put their bread to practical use by making what an ex-perienced mother calls "bread omelet." Cur the bread in very thin slices-and there is nothing that one can slice so thin as stale bread -and dip the slices in beaten eggs. Fry in hutter.
