The great want of the advanced workingmen of the large continental cit es has long been for small. comfortable dwellings, and this want is being rapidly met by the introduction of the English houses of non, which are not only warm, strong, and reasonably elegant, but cheaper than can be built in Vienna, at least of any domestic material. > COAL CUTTING BY MACHINERY .- There is now every prospect that the getting of coal by n achinery will be more generally adopted than has hitherto been the ease. At present it has been adopted at only a few places; but a new machine, patented by Mesers Gillot & Copley. has just been tested of the Wharneeliffe Sillestone Colliery, near Barreley, in the presence of a number of mining engineers from various parts of the kingdom, and with most ra isfactory results. In 133 minutes a brak of coal 58 yards long and 4 feet 8 inches thick was cut to a depth of 3 feet 1 inch. The quantity of coal so cut would be about 80 tons in the time stated. In connection with coal machinery, a hydraulic coal breaker, patented by Mr. Chubb, of London, has just been very sucesfully tested as the Caks Colliery. Barneley, it brings down the coal in vast blocks, affecting a saving by making little or no slack. The owners of the Caks Colliery are so sa sanified. with the machine that they have given orders for four of them.—Leeds Mercury.
