en fête for the occasion. The whole body of citizens, from the mayor down, seems to participate in the religious ceremonies and the subsequent festivities. The streets surrounding the family-residence, and in the vicinity of the Cathedral presented a gala appearance, and from every available point in the town flags were flying in honor of the event. Early in the morning the family assembled at Royal House on Provencher Avenue, which had been secured for the accommodation of the guests, and which was gaily decorated with evergreen and bunting, amongst the latter, the French, Scotch, and British flags being conspicuous. The bride having been presented with a handsome bouquet by the youngest grandchild little Germaine Paradis, the party proceeded to the Cathedral where the nuptial mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Dandurand, O. M. I., of St. Charles, who, it must be mentioned as one of the unique circumstances in connection with this event, was the priest who performed the marriage ceremony in Bytown full fifty years ago. The bride was given away by Mr. S. A. D. Bertrand, whilst Mr. Felix Chenier performed a similar office for the groom, and a number of grand children as bridesmaids and pages. The cathedral, which was well filled with worshippers, had been tastefully decorated for the occasion, and we have rarely seen anything more beautiful than the way in which the altar was adorned with choice flowers and evergreens. During the mass some exquisite music was rendered, notably a "Sancta Maria" by Mrs. Lloyd, and Millard's "Ave Maria" by Mrs. A. Bernhart. An appropriate and touching sermon was preached by the Rev. Fr. Cherrier, who represented the Archbishop, His Grace much to his regret being unable to be present in person owing to his trip to Hochelaga to attend another golden jubilee, that of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. At the close of the service the wedding party returned to the house, where Mr. Geo. Germain read and presented to his parents an address signed by all the children; and Mrs. Dr. Demers, nee Richer, read a similar address signed by all the grand children. Both addresses were illuminated and were really works of art. The party then sat down to a sumptuous wedding breakfast, at which the usual toasts were proposed and felicitous speeches made. In the evening when the invited guests assembled, Mr. James E. P. Prendergast, M. P., Mayor of St. Boniface, read and presented an address from the citizens, accompanied with a most substantial present of gold. Several congratulatory speeches were made after which a very enjoyable time was spent by the company, dancing, feasting, and music being maintained until late the following morning. Wedding gifts, both numerous and valuable, were received from all parts of the continent, and the happy couple were also the recipients of innumerable messages of congratulation, and affecting tributes of affection, admiration, and esteem, from friends in distant parts who much regretted their inability to be present in person.

In closing our report we would offer to Mr. and Mrs. Germain our fervent congratulations, and our heartfelt wishes that they may yet be spared for many years. They are both, notwithstanding their advanced age, hale and hearty, and possessed of sound health and strength to a degree which many young people might well envy, and we trust that it may be our pleasurable task, or the task of some other local writer of that time, to congratulate them upon their attainment, with little diminution of their intellectual and bodily vigor of the years of centenarians.
