Inquiries of the Ministry

Mr. Stanfield: Has the government directed its attention in any particular way to the control of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines and the extent to which this company might be affected?

Mr. Greene: Mr. Speaker, Trans-Canada Pipe Lines is, to the best of my knowledge, something like 90 per cent or more Canadian owned, and from what I have seen to date I do not think that these purported transactions would affect the continuation of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines as a Canadian owned and Canadian controlled company.

POST OFFICE

INQUIRY AS TO INCREASE IN FIRST CLASS MAIL RATE

Mr. A. D. Hales (Wellington): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct my question to the Minister without Portfolio in charge of the Post Office. In view of the fact that the United States has increased its rate for first class mail to eight cents, is it the intention of the Canada Post Office to increase its first class mail rate?

Hon. Jean-Pierre Côté (Minister without Portfolio): Mr. Speaker, it may not be because the United States is increasing its rate, but right now we are studying this question.
