federal Government will be shafted by their provincial counterparts because it will be deprived of \$34,000 million. It will not receive that money.

Since January 1, 1980 the kitty has built up to \$94. Half of that is \$47 million. The Calgary Olympics will be in 1988. I do not think we have to worry about that because this Government will no longer be in power. Those individuals opposite will be sitting on your left, Mr. Speaker. They will not have to worry about lotteries, the olympic games, or anything else.

The university games were supposed to receive money from the agreement now in existence. They have not received any. The Calgary Olympics was supposed to get money from this agreement. It has not received a cent. This was put in as part of the agreement. I think there must be a few Liberals in Calgary. I cannot understand it, they are not complaining enough. They should get after this Minister. I am surprised that some people in Edmonton do not give the Minister a block from the blind side when he comes to Edmonton because he sure has not done a job for them. No wonder the Liberals are dead in the Province of Alberta. It is unbelievable what this Government had done to them.

The Hon. Member for Mississauga South (Mr. Blenkarn), the Hon. Member for St. Catharines (Mr. Reid) and my friend from Selkirk-Interlake (Mr. Sargeant) have all expressed their feelings. They know exactly what is happening. It is funny that we on this side know what kind of ding-a-lings the people of Canada will get, yet over there all they do is smile. Let me tell them, whether it be two months from now, six months from now or whenever the next election comes along, we will show you who the ding-a-lings are, and who is going to get ding-a-linged.

Mr. Maurice A. Dionne (Northumberland-Miramichi): Mr. Speaker, I do not know if I can be as amusing as the speaker who just completed his remarks. I will try and stick a little more closely to the motion before us. I might offer a few comments on what was said by the Hon. Member for Edmonton North (Mr. Paproski). If it had not been for the action of that Member when he was Minister, we would not have the proposed Bill before us at this time. We would have Loto Canada receipts to do that which this Bill proposes to do.

The Hon. Member talked about ripping off the public by those who were selling the Loto Canada tickets. I believe the people involved in that operation will take some resentment from that remark, particularly since he was so anxious to pass it off to his kindred folk in the Provinces. Is he now suggesting that they are continuing to rip off Canadians?

He then accused the Government of turning over responsibility for this Bill to a poor little guy in the other place who can hardly walk. I find that they resemble each other physically. That little guy in the other place may not be a great walker, but he has considerable ability to run.

It is appropriate that Motion No. 1 to amend Bill C-95 be adopted by this House because it ensures that the arts and culture, fitness and amateur sport and medical and health

research will be represented on the board of directors. That is entirely worthwhile and probably should have been in the original Bill.

It was strange to hear the Hon. Member for Mississauga South (Mr. Blenkarn) condemn that proposal as being an opportunity for the Government to get its friends on the board of directors. Exactly the opposite is true. What makes his condemnation even more strange is that it was his Party which proposed this motion in Committee. The Government accepted it because it thought it was a good idea. When it accepted that proposal, it did not expect the Opposition to change its position. I therefore urge the Members of the opposition to at least be consistent when debating Bill C-95.

I was surprised to hear the remarks of the Hon. Member for Edmonton North regarding the Calgary Olympics. I am surprised he does not want the proceeds from the lotteries that will be established under Bill C-95 to go to the Fifteenth Olympic Games in Calgary.

Mr. Paproski: That is not true.

Mr. Dionne (Northumberland-Miramichi): The Hon. Member says that is not true. I suggest he make his position clear because he has not done that to date. He cannot have it both ways.

Mr. Paproski: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order. I would like to straighten out the Hon. Member. I know he really does not mean to say what he is saying at this time because that is not what I said. I said that there are moneys available now amounting to \$47 million which the federal and provincial Governments have that could go to fitness and amateur sport with the other \$47 million for culture. Between now and 1988 there will be sufficient funds if the federal Government keeps on getting \$34 million under that particular agreement. Forget about this Bill at this time. I was referring to the agreement that we now have. At \$34 million annually between now and 1988 there will be sufficient funds to look after the piece of the action which the federal Government is supposed to provide for, I believe in the area of \$200 million. That includes coins, stamps and all the other little things. If it puts aside the moneys it is now getting from the lotteries, there would be sufficient money not only for the university games in Edmonton this year, but for the Olympics in 1988.
