## Oral Questions

Hon. Don Mazankowski (Deputy Prime Minister and President of the Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, the Canadian Aviation Safety Board did undertake a very extensive investigation into this matter. It is my recollection that the conclusions that were arrived at, both by the Canadian Aviation Safety Board and the inquiry in India, were quite similar in nature.

NICARAGUA—UNITED STATES FUNDING OF CONTRA ATTACKS

Mr. Dan Heap (Spadina): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Secretary of State for External Affairs. Will the Minister tell the House, when he meets with the U.S. Secretary of State, Mr. George Schultz, in what terms he plans to convey the repugnance that Canadians feel toward the continuing violation of the Charters of the United Nations and the Organization of American States by the U.S. continuing funding of terrorist Contra attacks from Honduras into Nicaragua?

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, the Government of the United States knows that Canada differs fundamentally in our assessment of the problem in Central America, and consequently in the appropriate solutions. I have made that position clear on several occasions, and the Prime Minister has made it clear to the President. I will again be making that position clear to Secretary Schultz when I meet him later today. It is our view that our most constructive contribution to the resolution of the problems in Central America is to concentrate on the constructive, practical help that Canada can give, whether by way of development assistance, or by way of support for the Contadora process, rather than succumbing to the temptation of rhetoric and condemnation.

Member, not only on the open attitude he has always shown with respect to political issues in Latin America but also on the competition he is giving me with respect to the use of French in this House.

INQUIRY CONCERNING POSITION OF LIBERAL PARTY

The Chair does not want to be unfair. We have just had an example of the reaction that is engendered in the Chamber when perhaps too full use is made of such quotes. However, I would ask the Hon. Minister to respond, keeping in mind that a debate in this Chamber in Question Period as to what somebody is quoted as having said in the press is not always helpful.
