I am influenced very much by legislation brought to the Order Paper by the former Government which has not become law. I am thinking also of a decision recently in Toronto involving Harry Kopypo who was found guilty of contempt of court and had a serious penalty imposed upon him but was not allowed in his own defence to prove that the allegations he was making were true. I am not making the point that the allegations were true. I think Canadians were surprised to find that in that type of a situation the truth was irrelevant and not something that could be pleaded by an accused. This amendment, which I commend to the House, I hope will become law during this Parliament.
