

Clerk of the Crown in Chancery now reads the titles as before, and the Clerk of the Senate announces that they are reserved for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure.

105. The Speaker of the Commons now ^{Supply Bill.} addresses His Excellency in both languages, as follows:—"May it please Your Excellency;—The Commons of Canada have voted certain supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service. In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill, intituled, 'An Act, &c.,' (Supply Bill), to which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's assent." The Speaker delivers the Bill to the Clerk of the Senate, who hands it to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, who reads the title in both languages; and the Clerk of the Senate signifies the Royal Assent, thus: "In His Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks His loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."
