HOME RULE SURE, SAYS SIR ALFRED

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—Sir Alfred Mond today declared that home rule would come, pass when the British public do not take Ulster's threat seriously.

Being an ardent free trader, Sir Alfred was anxious to know something about Canada's probable attitude on the tariff question in view of the U. S. government's recent action. He asks: Will Canada remove the duty on wheat now that the United States Government stand ready to take theirs off?
