LAURIER SPEAKS TOMORROW NIGHT

NON-PARTISAN SPEECH

Address Also Will Be Given by Other Prominent Men.

OLD G. T. R. EMPLOYE DIED ON SATURDAY

James McInerney Was Nearly Eighty-Five Years Old and Very Well Known.

An old resident of Toronto and an employee of the Grand Trunk Railway for 40 years, passed away on Saturday, in the person of James McInerney. The late Mr. McInerney was in his 85th year, and had been for many years a member of the G. T. R. Veterans' Association. Three sons and four daughters survive. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning from the family residence at 156 Booth avenue, to St. Ann's Church, thence to St. Michael's Cemetery.

NORDHEIMER RECITAL

An audience that filled Nordheimer Hall and overflowed into the rooms adjacent, listened to the piano and vocal recital of Herr Hugo Kihl and the Mezzosoprano and Kump on Friday evening. Mr. Kihl displayed all the perfection of technique with which musical Toronto is so familiar. "Thirty-Two Variations in C Minor" (Bach) was interpreted in all the variety of its demands, and the "Andante in F Minor" by the same composer, was given with exquisite tenderness and appreciation of melody. In the second group, from Chopin, Mr. Kihl showed that strength as well as delicacy of touch and tenderness of expression are features of his artistry. Applause and many recalls were given the talented pianist.

Miss Armour sang three selections—"Euse's Dream" (Lohengrin), "Morgens" (Strauss), and "Candide." The singer gave evidence that she possesses a clear, ringing, vibrant soprano voice. Repeated applause and several bouquets were accorded her performance. "Fair Jessie," a number culled from the most delicious and a good deal of sentimentality of expression, was sung by Miss Kump to considerable applause. Both singers are pupils of Mrs. H. Ethel Shepherd, who accompanied them and shared in the honours of the recital.

The name of Miss Denison Dr. Dana was on the program, but owing to a cold Miss Dana was unable to be present.
