proceed only from Principle, prove a fixed Dislike, while the Sincerity of the Approbation argued for from the Acceptance of the others, is justly to be doubted, and it's Continuance not to be depended on; as Interest may change, but Principle can not.

If it be said, that the great Fortunes of some, who have thus listed themselves under the Minister, raise them above the Insluence of so mean a Motive, it must be remembered, that where Avarice has taken Possession of the Soul, it's Force increases with the Increase of it's Acquisitions, and grasps still at more; or let Ambition, which too often over-balances Reason, in youthful Minds, be substituted in the Place of Interest, in the Argument, and the Conclusion, will be the same.
