

SUNDERLAND NINTH FAIR GREATEST EVER

Farmers, Visitors and Buyers Through the Market and Admire Prize Winners.

The ninth annual and greatest Xmas market and fair for dress, meats, fowl, butter and eggs was held in Brock Township Hall, Village of Sunderland, yesterday.

The farmers of Brock and surrounding townships are justly celebrated for good horses, fine cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry. The weather being favorable and fairly good sleighing, the farmers, with their wives, sons and daughters turned out in large numbers, vying with each other in competition for the many prizes offered. It is safe to say that in no township in the Dominion has there been a greater nor will there be a finer lot of poultry and dressed meats, than were on exhibition.

The executive, composed of A. H. Falldown, W. Tocher, R. A. Purvis, J. Miller, J. W. Thompson and the genial and painstaking secretary, Mr. Tocher, and the village inspector, Mr. James Brethour, are one and all to be complimented for conducting a successful issue of the best market and Xmas fair ever in this thriving and enterprising community. The competition in all the different classes was so keen, especially in the poultry, that the judges found themselves nonplussed in many instances in making their awards, but so well did they do their work that no fault was found with their various decisions. There were many buyers of poultry, conspicuous amongst them being Citizens George Beal, the enterprising butcher and live stock dealer, who alone bought about two tons of the finest poultry, amongst which were many of the prize winning birds, which doubtless grace his finely equipped shop, which would distance many shops in Toronto that are thought to be amongst the top-notchers. The Marquis Bros., who are well known live stock dealers and butchers, also were heavy buyers of poultry, taking two horse sleds loads away to ship to their many customers.

And so good was the quality that the prices obtained were from one to two cents per lb. higher than Toronto prices. The judges of poultry were John Beal and A. W. Mayhew, of this city. The noted horse judge, J. M. Gardiner of Weston, distributed the ribbons amongst the prize winners in horses and gave great satisfaction.

Another feature which gave great satisfaction to a large number of the visitors, especially the ladies, was the demonstration in butter making, the very instructive lecture delivered by Mr. Frank Kingston, assistant dairy inspector for Eastern Ontario, being listened to by an attentive and appreciative audience.

Sunderland is the centre of an industrial and most prosperous district and as a proof of this two banks, the Standard and Home, are both doing a profitable business. Mr. R. A. Purvis, one of the executive committee mentioned above, is the general manager of the Home Bank. There are many cattle dealers in this vicinity, amongst them being the present Brock Township, Maurice Bros., Jos. Stone, who took the championship for his steer and Guelph, as well as winning many other prizes.

There are two good and well kept hotels in Sunderland, the Brock House, by Mr. T. Gurn, and the Guelph, by Mr. Collins.

ELECTRIC LINE FOR GOLD BELT

Berlin Road Wants Increase of Capital—Kingston Wishes to Guarantee Bonds of New Hotel.

A new electric railroad in the northern gold district is contemplated, according to a private bill application which has just reached the parliament buildings. The Forcypine Rand Belt Electric Railway is the name of the new enterprise. It applies for incorporation, and intends to run through the Township of McGarry, west and south to Larder City, thence west to Dams, crossing the line of the T. and N. O. Railway by a grade separation at the head waters of the Merrimack River; thence west to Kenagamis Lake, on the Mattagami River. The application also asks for power to connect the line with the T. and N. O. and other railway which may be built in the north.

Since the notice was sent out by the Ontario Government that no extensions of time for receiving applications for private bills would be made, everybody with the intention of presenting a bill is getting busy, and a number of applications have already reached the parliament buildings.

The Berlin and Bridgeport Electric Railway Company, which operates a suburban line out of Berlin, is applying for power to reincorporate the company, and to change its name to that of the Berlin and Northern Electric Company. Permission to increase its capital stock to \$400,000 is also asked for. If the application is granted, it is the intention of the company to extend its line to Berlin and Pergus.

The St. Catharines General and Marine Hospital asks for power to purchase and hold real estate needed for hospital purposes.

Lindsay and Kingston have applied for legislation to confirm several by-laws. The City of Kingston wants to give a fixed assessment and to guarantee the bonds for a new hotel which is contemplated.

Harry Sanders, whose address is not given, is making application to be made a barrister by special legislation.

GEARY SPEAKS FOR HYDRO

Controller Church Warns Up Against The News.

Addressing the northern ratepayers in the Essex-street School last night, Mayor Geary strongly urged them to support the hydro-electric bylaw at the coming election. He reiterated what has already been proven of the expansion of Toronto in every way, and said: "We need hydro extension. It will pay for itself from the start. The increased revenue will enable us to reduce the rates and you know that the other companies have been forced to meet our rates, and we have shown them that they can do it." His statement was greeted with applause.

Controller Church jumped on the news with both feet. He was widely aggrieved at that journal's cartoons and editorials relative to him, and said several reproachful things about it.

Ald. May, seeking re-election in Ward Five, warmly espoused the cause of the tubes, the Bloor viaduct and the other bylaws.

Mr. John Meredith, candidate for alderman, and Mr. McTeargart, candidate for school board, also spoke. Thomas Jones was chairman.

FOR CANDIDATES COMING OUT.

Everything has been put in readiness at the city hall for the nomination of the mayor and the controllers which will be held in the assembly room, at 10 o'clock Friday. Chairs for the citizens of Toronto to support the bylaws on New Year's Day, he emphasized the point that practically all of them were self-supporting.

"Why, we are getting \$5,000 revenue from the street railway as it is," he explained, "and the tubes would be just as profitable."

TORONTO READY NOW FOR TUBES—HOCKEN C. P. R. Certain to Give Local Connecting Service From West Toronto—W. F. Maclean.

"Is Toronto ready for a subway? Those who say 'No' have not studied the subway question in other great cities."

Controller Hocken thus summed up a lucid address in favor of the tube proposals, at a meeting in the public library, Annette street, last night. A. M. Wilson presided.

"Anyone who thinks Toronto is not going to have a million of population in a few years is a pessimist of the worst kind," declared Controller Hocken, "and besides, there are 25,000 more street railway passengers per year in Toronto now than in New York, when the first subway was built there."

"In dealing with the Toronto Railway Company," he continued, "you are dealing with the same men who had to deal with in the hydro-electric fight for kind," declared Controller Hocken, "and William Mackenzie, the same Sir Henry Pellatt—the same gentlemen all through."
