# Showing Dewdney Road, North of the C.P.R. Terminals, Coquitlam. A Present About 100 Men and 20 Teams Are Building Roads There.

Metropolitan Streets in Coguitlar

The above picture of the Dewdney Road, one of the future industrial and business streets in Coquitlam, shows how they do things in the new city.

Dewdney Road separates the C.P.R. property, which will all be used for actual railway purposes, from the Terminal Townsite, which is owned and controlled by us, and adjoins the C.P.R. terminals.

It is 100 feet wide, and is being built in a thoroughly firstclass modern manner. The crushed rock they are using is crushed at Coquitlam by the municipal rock crusher. At present M. P. Cotton & Co. have about two hundred men working clearing roads and streets at Coquitlam, while the municipality has about one hundred, with teams grading and finishing roads.

About one thousand men are at work on the C.P.R. tracks and sidings, nearly one hundred on the new forty-eight-stall roundhouse, the first unit of which is being built by Sanford Gordon & Son, and is under contract to be finished by June 30, 1912, and about three hundred in the building trades at Coquitlam-building houses, hotels, etc.

Six months ago there was nothing but a level tract of land at Coquitlam, three months ago there was practically nothing but a few shanties, and they are adding almost every day to the numbers of workmen there.

We, ourselves, are building at the present time twenty-fiv houses at Coquitiam, also a \$30,000 industrial spur railwa track to serve the industries, wholesalers; etc., at Coquitlam
