## OFFICIAL WILL SETTLE ALL TRADE DISPUTES

The senior British trade commissioner in Canada and Newfoundland, Montreal, has been notified by the imperial department or overseas trade in London, that he is empowered to appoint an expert to examine and report upon consignments of goods from the United Kingdom, in respect of which a dispute has arisen, and to certify the signature of which a dispute has arisen, the commissioner will, however, only intervene when requested to do so by both parties to the dispute.

The kind of disputes in which the commissioner may intervene are those regarding goods which are alleged to be not up to sample, or which have been given in a damaged condition, owing to faulty packing. The commissioner is not authorized to deal with claims under insurance policies for goods damaged during the voyage.

As the official trade representative in Canada and Newfoundland, the Indian government, the commissioner is also authorized to act in regard to disputes relative to shipments from India.

The remuneration of experts appointed by the commissioner is a matter for the parties to the dispute. No fee will be charged for his services.

The British trade commissioner at Toronto, F. W. Field, 257 Confederation Life Bldg., is empowered to act in disputes arising out of shipments to Toronto and to other centres in Ontario.

## Gaelic Society Pledges Support to Lewis Widows

At the regular monthly meeting of the Canadian Gaelic Society, held in the Canadian Foresters' Hall last Saturday, a resolution was adopted in which the society pledged itself to contribute as much as possible to the fund for the support of relatives of 250 sailors of the Island of Lewis, Scotland, who went down on H. M. S. Lalla.

The tragedy occurred on New Year's Day, 1918, when the ship, getting too close to the rocks which surround the island, smashed itself dead on the rocks, with the loss of the sailors who were on their way home for their furlough period.

The Island of Lewis has a population of some 22,000, out of which 7000 are left to support the families of the men who were killed. The appeal for the Red Cross netted more than \$75,000.

## TAKEN ON CHARGE KILLING OWN SON

James A. Hartwick Held at Kingston on Accusation of Parham Murder.

Kingston, March 1.—A sensational arrest was made this morning, when Provincial Detective A. B. Boyd took into custody James A. Hartwick on a charge of murder, in connection with the death of his son, Frederick Hartwick, who was found dead within one hundred yards of his father's barn in the village of Parham, on Feb. 12. Father and son went out into a bush a short distance from Parham, on the afternoon of Feb. 12, shooting rabbits. The father came home that night, but the son did not, and the next day a searching party found the dead body of the young man. First reports of the fatality stated that young Hartwick had accidentally shot himself, but the case took a sensational turn when the coroner's jury, presided over by Dr. Geddes of Verulam, returned a verdict to the effect that the son had not died "by some unknown hand." It was stated that two bullet wounds were found in the young man's body, and that the fact had been established that the bullets could not have been fired from young Hartwick's rifle.

Claims are innocent.

Following the verdict of the coroner's jury, the attorney-general's department at Toronto was notified, and Detective Boyd was placed on the case, and the arrest of the father comes as a result of his investigation. The accused was brought to Kingston at one o'clock this morning and lodged in a cell at the police station, and will come before Magistrate Farrell on a charge of murder. The prisoner claims that he is innocent. He admits he was out shooting rabbits with his son on the afternoon in question, but states that his son stated that he would remain a while longer in the bush to continue his hunt. He says this was the last time he saw his son alive, and that he knows nothing whatever about the shooting.

Will Make Report.

The accused is a well-known resident of Parham. His son formerly lived in Kingston, and was also well known. He resided in Earl street, was employed at the Locomotive Works, and was 25 years of age. Besides his wife, he leaves two children, a son and a daughter. Dr. W. P. Connell of Kingston, was at Parham on Thursday, and conducted a post-mortem examination on the body of young Hartwick and it is understood that he will have an interesting report to make on his finding. Detective Boyd has been working on the case for over a week.

Hartwick was brought before Magistrate Farrell this forenoon, and charged with the murder of his son, but at the request of J. L. Whiting, coroner, was remanded till Thursday next. He was not asked to plead. The accused, who is about 55, showed no signs of emotion when the charge was read, altho he appeared somewhat dazed, and asked the magistrate to explain the charge to him again, and his worship did so.
