Chicago Expert Says April Crop Condition is Excellent—Argentine Grain Shipments.

Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day 3/4 to 1/2 lower than yesterday, and corn futures 1/4 lower.
At Chicago, May wheat closed 1/2 lower than yesterday, May corn 1/4 higher, and May oats 1/4 higher.
Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat, 3,000; corn, 80,000; oats, 100,000; week and year ago, holdovers.
Argentine shipments: Wheat, this week, 2,200,000; corn, 414,000, 252,000; last year, 1,800,000; wheat, 1,844,000; corn, 1,600,000.
Chicago, April 20.—Mr. Jones says the April crop is on a higher basis than last year, around 90,000,000. Nebraska condition is good, but not so far advanced as Kansas. Millers in Texas say harvest will begin May 15 to 20.

The Rev. T. G. Gibbons, rector of Wickham Episcopal, near Wingham, England, has just received from a firm of solicitors an intimation that he has become entitled to a considerable fortune, including a landed estate in Lincolnshire of over two thousand acres. The bequest is made on the condition that Mr. Gibbons changes his name to that of Lincoln. He is the last survivor of a family bestriking that name.
