

## LAST JUBILEE DAY BUT ONE

The Queen Returned to London Yesterday.

## A VISIT TO KENSINGTON

Where Six Hundred Children Sang the National Anthem.

London, June 28.—The Queen returned to London this afternoon for the final Jubilee day but one—made more so by the fact that her last Jubilee appearance during her reign in the metropolis. For, with the celebration that closes at Aldershot on Thursday next, the state public appearances of Her Majesty are said, on fair official authority, to be finished; hereafter, for whatever span of life may be left to her, Queen Victoria will confine herself to such work for the state as can be done at Windsor, Balmoral or Osborne.

The Queen thinks, so the statement runs, that she has done enough. The unexampled devotion to and acceptance of her obligations to her people have over 60 years won for her well-deserved rest, and in so far as the Sovereign can, she now proposes to let the burden of responsibility fall on those who must bear it when she passes away.

It was the knowledge of this, pathetically mingling with loyalty, that lent such deep interest to today's proceedings, fittingly devoted in the first instance to a visit to Kensington. As Her Majesty has always cherished a special interest in the district, it was fitting that today's visit was one of mingled pleasure and sadness, it seemed indeed a farewell.

Her Majesty arrived at Paddington at 12.30 p.m. She was in the best of health and walked with less difficulty than usual. The same ceremonies of semi-state procession were observed on her arrival a week ago.

At St. Mary Abbot's, an address from the inhabitants of her birthplace was presented to the Queen. Six hundred children, the Kensington Church School were assembled on a platform inside the railings and sang the National Anthem as the Queen passed.

Her Majesty's reply, a handwritten note to the address, thanking them for their loyal and kind expressions, and adding: "I gladly renew my association with a place which, as the scene of my birth and summons to the throne, has ever held and will hold with me sweet and tender recollections."

Across the gates of Kensington Palace was a banner on which was inscribed "Home, Sweet Home." Her Majesty saw it and seemed deeply affected.

At the Garden Party. Her Majesty reached Buckingham Palace at 1.30 p.m., and at about 5 o'clock entered the grounds to be present at the garden party, for which 6,000 invitations had been issued. Her Majesty was received with almost frenzied greetings, and took up her position, to which she was escorted by a staff of 100, summing up of his experience. He says: "How they detest the Germans. They abated from a single cheer before the Kaiser's cruiser, and then they began to cheer the British flag."

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## WHERE WILL IT ALL END?

Curiosity Predominates Now at Ottawa.

## SENATOR MILLER'S MOTION

Has Made the Situation Decidedly Interesting.

The Investigating Committee Will Meet This Morning to Organize. The Senate Leaders Had a Confab. But Reached No Agreement. Back Bench Liberals Show a Disposition to Kick Over the Tracks. It is Said Their Love for Mr. Tarte is Diminishing as Time Rolls On.

Ottawa, June 28.—(Special.)—Just what is going to happen as a result of the adoption of Senator Miller's motion for a committee to enquire into the Drummond County Railway subsidy it is impossible to predict tonight. The committee meets to-morrow morning for organization, and by the time the Senate meets it is possible that the Government may have an announcement to make which will obviate for this year any investigation. There are some Liberals who strongly favor a compromise, while others are strong advocates of resistance to what they consider Senatorial interference.

Mr. Macdonald, Sir Oliver Mowat had been friendly talk tonight, but what transpired is not known, except that an agreement was reached. The Conservatives consider they gained a strong point by compelling Mr. Blair to curtail the amount proposed.

It is significant, and indeed a subject of comment in the lobby, that the members on the Liberal side are kicking over the traces. Not a day passes but that some backbenchers are in open rebellion. Many of these are Liberals, but some are Conservatives. Mr. Tarte, who certainly is not the ideal of Liberalism that he was six months ago.

Toronto, June 28.—(Special.)—The fact that a new specimen of marine architecture is now being constructed at the Polar ship yard, this fact alone is sufficient to attract the attention of the public.
