Valencia, Spain, Feb. 3.—The anti-Jesuit demonstrations, which began in Madrid in connection with the anti-semitic play "El Zibor," have spread to Valencia. To-day crowds gathered in front of the Jesuit college of the Sacred Heart, where a confrontation of children was in progress, and shouted, "Liberty forever!" and "Down with the Jesuits!" A Jesuit, who was leaving the church, was hooted, and

Program (programme); the (though);

far (throughout); fare (through); fare

out (throughout); escape (escape); pro-

log (prologue); decelerate (decelerate);

pedagogue (pedagogue); pedagogy (pedagogy).

We again refer to the question of re-

formed spelling because a pamphlet on

that subject, by George D. Brownell, has

been placed on our shelves. It is a book

which is an earnest supporter of The World's

innovation. The work is published in

Chicago, where reformed spelling is mak-

ing more headway than at any other

place.

As we still stand alone among the

newspapers of Canada as practical ad-

vocates of spelling reform, we are by no

means sorry for our position. We have

at times on viewing the orthographic

butchery for which we were responsible,

and we think our readers, too, have be-

come accustomed to the changes. Reformed

spelling, for those who are not in a posi-

tion to take, but the results have justified

the risk. The reputation of the paper as

an advocate of reforms that it has not

been able to make has been a source of

advantage to the paper. It has been a

source of progress and up-to-date infor-

mation, while it has lost neither influ-

ence nor prestige among the ultra-conserv-

atives. If we have accomplished nothing

we have at least established the fact

that the daily paper can take a hand

in the work of spelling reform without

sacrificing its circulation or its influence.
