CLARK CASE IS UP TO-DAY

Defence Will Move to Have Prisoner Discharged if Prosecution Is Not Ready.

RUMOR THAT PAPERS ARE NOT HERE.

Two or Three Days Likely to Be Consumed in the Effort to Ho

Millionaire's Son.

The case where the State of Massachusetts requests the extradition of young George Clark of Pittsburg will come up in Judge Donaghy's court this morning. The defence asserted, late Thursday evening, that they had been informed that the papers had not arrived, and that a motion would be made to have the prisoner discharged, if the trial could not proceed at once. The authorities, however, declare that sufficient papers have arrived to warrant the trial, and that no delay will result from the fact that the trial is adjourned for two or three days to be consumed.

Clark is a young man, who was in business in Lynn, Mass. In the course of business he secured a number of cheques, it is claimed that four of these, aggregating \$200, were never sent to him. He was charged with securing money under false pretences. There were two other charges, growing out of a similar transaction, however, where Clark received a suit of clothes from the defendant's hotel, settling in each case with a cheque, which the authorities claim, was never paid.

The defence will be that the cheques were given to him by the defendant, and placed in the bank, and that no offence was committed. The case was heard by Judge Morgan established the precedent of admitting a man charged with being a fugitive from justice to bail.

Hamilton, Aug. 28.—The Board of Health was called to-night to hear evidence respecting the complaints of bad odors in the east end, chiefly from the Freeman Fertilizing Works. J. Weyms, ready with a book of testimonials to give the board information, H. Carscallen, K.C., appeared for the Freeman Co., and protested against the taking of irresponsible evidence from the public. The works represented an outlay of \$35,000, and the board could not afford to be injurious to the public health.

He was 61 years of age, and leaves a widow and son and daughter, who reside in Chicago. He was a general manager of the Freeman Fertilizing Works, and had been in the city for some time.
