Anglo-American Relations.

Rioting in Paris—The Anti-Dreyfusites Angry.

Lord Byron the Niath Is a Bankrupt.

President Kruger Preparing for Trouble in the Transvaal-He Expects a Brush With the British.

London, April 26.-The Earl of Selborne, under secretary of state for the colonies, addressing a Conservative mass meeting this evening at St. Albans, Hertford, said he thought that if any justification of Lord Salisbury's policy were required, it was afforded by the present relations between the United States and Great Britain. "At a trying time," said his lordship, "the government preserved their self-control and waited for coolness, justice and common sense to reassert themselves.

Now the dark, miserable cloud which so long hung over the Anglo-Saxon peoples has drifted off. It is only a few days since British and American effectives and the same field exist her week. officers and men fell on the same field of conquest. They were not engaged in fratricidal strife, but were fighting shoulder to shoulder, and small though the incident was, it will be of importance in the history of the world. All must regret," continued Lord Selborne, "the lamentable cause of the incident; but the only three nations concerned were what he might term the 'three cousin nations of the world.'" He remarked that he had no doubt America and Germany in this matter would prove as amendable as Great Britain to the dictates of common sense.

LORD BYRON BANKRUPT. The first meeting of the creditors of Lord Byron (first cousin twice removed tween the German and the American of the sixth Lord Byron, the illustrious or English crews." poet, and ninth baron of the name). took place yesterday, and showed his liabilities to be £35,000 and his assets £50,000. A lawyer pleaded that his lordship should not be adjudicated a bankrupt as this would disqualify him from sitting in the House of Lords. The matter was adjourned. RIOTING IN PARIS.

The advocates and opponents of Dreyfus revision held rival meetings in Paris last evening, and fights oc-curred afterward in the streets. Several persons were injured.

The Figaro's publication of the evidence of Capt. Guignet before the court of cassation has thrown the anti-re-

visionists party into consternation. The Eclair and all the anti-Dreyfus papers are boiling with indignation, especi at the statement that the guilt of Dreyfus could be only inferentially established from the secret dossier. The Gaulois falls foul of the Figaro for its "infamous publication." Capt. Guignet's denunciation of Col du Paty de Clam as a forger is held to be a complete giv-

ing away of the case of the general OVER THE VAAL.

There is renewed uneasiness over the situation in the Transvaal. President Kruger's chief of staff, Gen. Joubert, is inspecting the frontiers and selecting places suitable for entrenchments. More rigid inspection of the military has been ordered. Kruger evidently is expecting hostilities with England. The Dutchmen are uneasy over the result of the petition to Joseph Chamberlain, signed by 21,000 English residents of the Transvaal, and setting forth their grievances. The British army at Cape Town is being steadily augmented.

CZAR'S ASSAILANT DEAD. The death in prison is reported of the fanatic police officer who attempted to assassinate the present Emperor of Russia when he was traveling in Japan, prior to his accession to the throne. The would-be assassin inflicted an ugly sword-wound upon the head of Nicholas, who was only saved by the presence of mind of his cousin, Prince George of Greece, who felled the assailant with a terrific blow on the

head with a stick. It is reported that the Corean emperor has leased three ports to a Russian whaling company. Two cabinet ministers have been banished through Lady Om, mistress of the emperor, because they opposed Russian demands. FIGHTING IN SAMOA.

Advices have been received from Apia, Samoan Islands, dated April 18, reporting that severe fighting has taken place between large bodies of friendly natives and the rebels. The casualties, it was thought, would not exceed twenty, and no Europeans were among the injured.

In the House of Commons the foreign secretary stated that Samoa in 1895 exported products representing £47,839, and imported £65,926. To Great Britain the exports were £5,400, and the imports therefrom £34,700; to the United States, exports £300, and imports, £16,800; Germany, exports £10,800, imports £10,600. The British subjects Samoa at the last census in 1895 were 459; Germans 20, and Americans

SUBSIDY FOR THE CABLE. The London Times announces that

the British Government has decided to contribute an annual subsidy to the full amount recommended in the report of the Pacific cable committee of 1896 for the construction of a Pacific cable from British Columbia to Australia. AGUINALDO COUNSELS ECONOMY Aguinaldo issued a circular to the rebel commanders, telling them to instruct their men to economize their fire, save the empty shells, and not to fire at the enemy when the latter is under cover. The Filipinos are also instructed never to fire at a longer range than 150 meters, and when they have a river or other obstruction in front to hold their fire until within 80 meters.

REV. DR. JORDAN

Conferring the Degree of D. D. on . Worthy Man-Appointed a Professor.

Kingston, April 26 .- Rev. Dr. W. G. Jordan, of Strathroy, has been ap-pointed assistant and successor to Rev. Prof. Mowat, professor of Orientals and Old Testament exegesis at Queen's, subject to the approval of the General Assembly.
In presenting Rev. W. G. Jordan, of

Strathroy, for the degree of D.D., Rev. Dr. Milligan, Toronto, gave an interesting account of the brilliant scholastic career of the reverend gentleman in the face of many difficulties. He was born in Whitby, Yorkshire, England, and after attending the national school was obliged at an early age to go into business. At nineteen he turned to the religious life, and for ten years engaged in religious work in various English towns. During this period he passed examinations in the subject prescribed for four successive years, coming out at the head of the lists. He graduated from the London University, taking a first-class in the final B.A. degree. After mature consideration through years of experience and study, he resolved to join the Presbyterian Church in England. He pursued for two years previous to entering the Presbyterian Church theological studies at Bradford, England, under Professors Duff and Shearer. Then he took two years' further study in the Presbyterian Theological College, London, of which Dr. Oswald Dykes is principal. His career here was also brilliant. Some nine years ago his inclinations took Mr. Jordan to Canada. Through the kindness of Prof. Dykes, he brought, and is the only one so far who has brought, a colonial commisison from the English Presbyterian Church of England to Canada. Soon after coming to this country he was settled at Strathroy, Ontario, where he still ministers to people who have learned to appreciate his superior qualities. Rev. Dr. Milligan spoke in appreciative terms of Mr. Jordan's rare scholarship, his fine spirit and his sagacious judgment, and of his great services to the church in

Western Ontario. Rev. Mr. Jordan made a becoming response, his modest and unassuming manner impressing his hearers most favorably. He did not believe the facts cited by Mr. Milligan were the grounds for conferring this honor upon him; they were simply in justification of it. During a career somewhat varied and always practical he had striven to be a true scholar. The work of the minister was narrower than it used to be, but the clergy might still help men to retain the sense that the great soul of the world is just, and that there is a
