Up to the present time, headquarters of neither party here has received word of any acclamations. Of the fifteen other seats there are eleven members returned by agreement of the Legislature by reason of their absence on Empire overseas service. Two extra representatives will be nominated and elected by the soldiers, and deferred elections are arranged for Athabasca and Peace River.
