Ottawa, March 21.—Trustee Foran today said that he considered the Wanderers are in fault in connection with the Stanley Cup fizzle at Kenora. They had due notice of the dates fixed by the trustees, and should have either reached an agreement with the Kenoras or at least signified their intention of playing on the date fixed by

This they did not do, and it looks as if they desired to secure a snap decision.

The claim of the Wanderers for winning the first match by default will not be considered by Trustee Foran.
