Several Men Who Saw Overseas Service May Be Forced To Leave G. T. R. Carshops-War Veterans Threaten To Demand Investigation Into the Case.

Stirred by a report that an order had been received from G. T. R. headquarters in Montreal to the effect that all one-armed men who had not been in the service of the company previous to the war and had since been employed in the local carshops, were to be let out, returned soldiers in this city are threatening to take action through the G. W. V. A. and other organizations, to bring about an investigation, according to a deputation which waited upon The Advertiser . The order was reported to have been received on Wednesday, and was to

be effective within one week. About a dozen men affected are reported to be feeling rather bitterly over the action. While they attach no blame to local officials and realize that the company must take measures to protect itself, the men believe that fate is deal ing them an unkind thrust, and that perhaps the government is largely to blame

not giving them greater protection.

That the order has been received is not denied by the officials of the company in this city. It was pointed out by them that they are absolutely helpiess no matter how great their sympathies are for the men. It was absolutely against the rules of the company to hire such men without the proper authority. according to one of the officials, it is only a matter of the company protect ing itself. If a man who has lost one hand is hired, he said, the company has to assume all the responsibility if by accident the man loses his other hand, and the Grand Trunk would be forced to recompense the man for total disability in-

POLISH DELEGATION LEAVES DANZIG FOR RIGA ON SUNDAY

Paris, Sept. 10.—A wireless dispatch sent by Prince Sapieha, the Polish foreign minister, to M. Tchitcherin, the Bolshevik minister of foreign affairs, says the Polish peace delegation, bearing full credentials and having powers to conclude an armistice and peace pre-liminaries will be ready to leave Danzig. liminaries, will be ready to leave Danzig September 12 for Riga.

DECIDE ON TERMS.

### Labor Organ Undecided About Accepting "Bolshevik Gold'

London, Sept. 10.—Admission was made this morning by the Heraid, organ of labor, that it has in its possession £75,000 of "Boishevik gold." The newspaper states the money is being held, pending a decision by the shareholders as to whether it should be used. The opinion of readers as to the acceptance of the money is asked by the newspaper which publishes the admission on its first page, under glaring headlines. Last month charges that the Russia soviet government was subsidizing papers in other countries for the purpose of carrying on propaganda, were published here, and the Heraid was named as one journal which had received money from the Bolsheviki. The newspaper refers to the soviet funds as "a magnificent demon

stration of real working-class solidarity, and of what Russians mean by nternationalist.' "To accept it," says the Herald, "will be to complete a notable epi
