

## How Mayor Little Is Building a Foundation for a GREATER LONDON

Every London citizen is proud of the industrial achievement of Mayor Little's first year. Factories are under construction, and more are coming. No matter what differences may occur at election time, in his heart every worker for London's upbuilding is glad to see this actual "delivering of the goods" in bonafide industries which ask no bonus, but shoulder their civic responsibilities with every other tax-payer, provide more opportunities for citizens, build more homes and increase the influence and prosperity of the whole community.

STONE NO. 6-- The returned veteran was given every preference. At the request of the united soldiers of the city, total tax exemption was given to every returned man possessing property valued under \$3,000. In this manner Mayor Little took advantage of all the power allowed him by the Government.

STONE NO. 7 -- That Mayor Little has handled aggressively his policy of encouraging new and greater industries to locate in the city is evidenced by the established fact that during the past year five concerns were actually brought to London, while three other large American firms have definitely announced that they will build factories here in 1921. Emphasis must be placed on the fact that these concerns have come to London with no promise of a bonus or tax exemption, but are prepared to shoulder their civic responsibilities with the other tax-payers. The building engineers of these various industries involved place the actual (not estimated) cost for the construction of their factories at figures that are far in excess of the three
