

HANTIAN MINISTER IS EXECUTED BY REBELS

Towns Declare Against Government and Gunboat Is Captured.

PORT AU PRINCE, Nov. 24.—The revolutionary movement against President Nord Alexis is spreading.

The Town of Aquin and Jérémie have both declared against the government. The Gunboat Croyant, which has fallen into the hands of the rebels, encountered the Gunboat Centaure off Jérémie and a number of shots were exchanged.

Gen. Leconte, the minister of the interior, who went out at the head of a government force against the rebels, was taken prisoner, and late advice received here apparently confirm the report of his execution. He was captured near Jérémie, together with his escort after a short struggle. The Town of Aquin, it is reported, has been pillaged by the revolutionary troops.

There is no news of the movements of General Celestin Cuylique, the minister of war, who was sent, with a detachment of 500 men, to put down the uprising at Cayes, he said, by Gen. Antoine Simon.

SAMMY NO GRAFT.

President Newsboys' Union Demands an Investigation.

The president of the Newsboys' Union called a meeting at the Labor Temple last night. Sammy Lightman, president of the union, told the meeting that he had been called "grafter." He charged the vice-president, John Hearst, and former Secretary Paddy Winstanley with so-called graft. He charged the investigation to clear his good name of the vile aspersion.

Organizer Thompson was put in the chair during a heated debate. The president offered to resign if any charge of graft could be proved against him, and if not proven his traducers should be fined.

The meeting adjourned, and to-night Organizers Thompson and Glicking will sit in judgment at the Labor Temple as a board of referees.

WOMEN TO CANVASS.

Thirty License Reductionists to Cover Ward 5.

In the Western Y.M.C.A. yesterday afternoon the western branch of the W.C.T.U. mapped out a canvassing campaign of Ward 5 in the interest of license reduction. There were fourteen women at the meeting. They decided to place 30 women canvassers in the district at once, each armed with a portion of the voters list, to make a house-to-house visitation. After a couple of weeks' work the lists will be returned to the executive of the Western Y.M.C.A. for distribution to the canvassers. Suggestions as to who are eligible to vote according to the lists and as to what names should be added.

ROOM FOR EVERYBODY.

Veterans Want Land Grant Act Extended to All Anglo Saxons.

A general meeting of the Imperial South African Veterans' Association was held in Williams' Cafe last evening when about 150 veterans were present.

The principal business of the meeting was to appoint a deputation to wait on the governor-general in reference to the proposal to extend the Volunteers' Bounty Act of 1908 to all men of the Anglo-Saxon race who took part in the South African war.

S. Brimwood and T. Wilshaw were appointed to serve on the deputation, with two representatives from Ottawa and one from Montreal.

CAMPAIGN FOR REDUCTION.

At a meeting of the executive of the central license reduction committee held in the Confederation Life Building yesterday afternoon reports were received showing progress in organization work throughout the wards. No public meetings will be held this week.

Just Fun.

The Boost Club had a members' meeting at the St. Charles last night. The question of the club interesting itself in municipal affairs was discussed, but met with little favor. The members decided that just fun is more in their line.

Bodies Mangled by Autos.

OSSING, N.Y., Nov. 24.—Almost in front of the gate leading to the estate of William Rockefeller, the mangled bodies of William C. Hardy and William Kramer, both of Tarrytown, were found. It is believed that the men were returning home this morning, and that they were struck by an automobile and killed.

Fatal Fire at a Funeral.

LOCUST CORNER, O., Nov. 24.—An explosion of coal oil, which was used in starting a fire, caused the death of Albert Bradburn aged 15 years; fatally burned Mrs. Emerick Carlin, and slightly injured two small children, aged 10 and 6. The explosion occurred just as the funeral party of Aaron Bradburn, an uncle of the dead girl, was leaving the house. Another member of the family was ill of typhoid fever.

Rev in the Jail.

It seems that there is "a bit of a row" at the jail. Governor Chambers refuses to discuss the matter, but Guard Connolly, who is said to be the investigated one, says simply: "There was a bit of a row and I came out on top."

An investigation is being carried on and Sheriff Mowat and the inspector of prisons are interested. The nature of the trouble was not disclosed.

Parkdale W. C. T. U.

A parlor meeting of the Parkdale W. C. T. U. was held last night at the home of Mrs. Jack, 30 Maynard-avenue. An address was given by J. O. McCarthy, most worshipful patriarch of North America of the Sons of Temperance, whose theme was the need of the hour in connection with license reduction. Aid. J. J. Graham and Aid. Adams were also present.

Fractured Rib.

As Mrs. A. Penke, 97 Victoria-street, passed thru a lane off St. Vincent-street last night, a pile of lumber in W. F. Petrie's back yard fell over the fence, striking her. She was taken to St. Michael's Hospital, where she was found to be suffering from a fractured rib.

Durham Debentures Approved.

A bridge over the Sauguenay at a cost of \$4000 is to be built by the Town of Durham, debentures for which were approved by the Ontario Railway Board yesterday.

OBITUARY

Robert Stewart.

The death of Robert Stewart occurred at the residence of his son, 70 Melville-avenue, yesterday. Deceased was a native of Leitrim County, Ireland, and came to this country at the age of eighteen, in the year 1869. He leaves a widow (sister of the late ex-Alderman John Irwin of this city) and six sons, John, William and Robert, of Port Credit; Henry and Irwin of Toronto, and Ellett of Niagara Falls, Ont. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 2.30 p.m. to Prospect Cemetery.

George Coleman, who died Monday, in his 83rd year, founded his baking business here in 1852, coming here from Montreal. His restaurant became in some respects a clubhouse for prominent persons. He retired ten years ago. He was a native of Ipswich, England, and was a member of the St. George's Society and York Pioneers. His widow and three daughters survive.

Lee Johnston, civic smoke inspector, is dead, following an operation. He was 44 years of age.

At Brampton: James Blackburn, aged 86; one-time hotel proprietor.

A number of old friends attended the funeral of Isaac Thompson on Monday at St. James' Cemetery. Mr. Thompson died last week at the age of 94. He worked until he was 86 as book-keeper for the O'Keefe Brewery Company, with which company he served for forty years. Mrs. Thompson died last June, and only a few months before her death she and Mr. Thompson celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of their wedding day.

RECEIVED STOLEN ORE.

Detectives Trace Mineral to Home of Fred Campbell.

Fred Campbell, 14 Stanley-avenue, a prospector, was caught hiding in his backyard last night by Detectives Guthrie, Wallace and Murray. He is charged with receiving a trunkload of stolen ore from Cobalt. The ore was watched and when landed at Toronto was followed from the station. When the wagon stopped in front of the house the detectives went in. They were told that Campbell was not at home, but on search they found him in the yard.

Life-Savers Organized.

At a public meeting held last night at the office of Jenkins & Hardy, Toronto, the committee appointed to organize a branch of the Royal Life Saving Society in Ontario. Provisional officers were chosen: Burroughs, president; J. H. Cochrane, Dr. Sheard and Inspector J. L. Hughes, secretaries; J. H. Crocker, assistant secretary. A. G. Mackenzie.

A grant of \$200 was given a like branch in New Zealand by that government, as well as a large grant given by Carnegie in the United States, and this society hopes for like support.

The object is to teach swimming and life-saving and the recognition of life savers. They will seek to have these things taught in public schools.
