NORTH TORONTO, Aug 31—(Special)—The recent action of the two town councillors, Messrs. Murphy and Grice, together with Mayor Brown (for the latter cannot dissociate himself from the whole transaction), while it has ceased to attract the widespread interest which first attached to it, has nevertheless aroused a feeling of great resentment among all classes.

Honest, frank opposition to the passage of the sewerage bylaw by these members prior to its adoption by the people would have been in order, but the steps taken to effect its ultimate defeat are here regarded as unworthy of the people's representatives.

A gentleman whose name is a household word in the city, and with large property and personal interests in the town, to the World to-night said: "I supported the bylaw for the installation of sewerage even while there were two or three points on which I was not wholly clear, but as a practical man, I felt it would be a great advantage to the town. But the defect or passage of the bylaw was a trifling matter compared to the question as to whether the sovereign voice of the people shall be obeyed or not. The principle introduced by these men is a vicious one, and no one can tell what harm will ensue from their action. It cannot be allowed to be lightly passed over."

"We can finance a scheme to install a good system of sewerage in this town," said another citizen to-night, "but we have no money to waste on getting the vote of the people, and then throwing it down like children." The men who ever they are who buried the sewerage bylaw ought to be held accountable for it.

Legal opinion will be secured as to the course to be followed, and the end of the entanglement is not yet.

It has been suggested in some quarters that recourse could be had as a last resort to the provincial board of health, in the belief that the latter could order the town to instal a sewerage plant, but the provincial board of health have not this power.

A well-known municipal officer whose opinion is seldom if ever at fault said to The World yesterday, "I am more than ever convinced that the action of the reluctant councillors was and is illegal."

The Consolidated Municipal Act, ch. 19, Edw. 7, sub-section 373, says explicitly: "A bylaw which is duly carried by the votes of the qualified electors shall within six weeks thereafter be passed by the council, providing, however, that where a bylaw which the council has been legally required by petition or otherwise to submit to a vote of the electors is duly carried it shall be the duty of the council within six weeks thereafter to pass the said bylaw."

Court of revision was held in the town hall to-night, but there were no outstanding features. Where will the money come from to pay for the land recently acquired at the rear of the waterworks, \$5000 in all?
