

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CUT OFF ARM WITH SWORD

Kiel Policeman's Feat During a Serious Socialist Riot.

KIEL, Feb. 16.—Further disturbances occurred at Neumünster, Schleswig-Holstein, where indignation meetings were held to protest against the action of the police in interfering with Sunday's demonstration against proposed Prussian franchise laws. A crowd gathered at the townhall and pelted and stoned the police. The latter attacked with drawn sabres, and also requisitioned a company of infantry, which with fixed bayonets cleared the square. A policeman cut off a man's arm with a sabre as his hand was raised to throw a stone.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Fire Commissioner Waldo has issued an order that all fire department autos must be marked at once: P. D. N. Y.

The letters are to be one foot high and two inches wide. They are to be painted in black on the rear of the bodies of the vehicles where anyone can see them who isn't blind. Fire department machines have been used for years to convey politicians to the race tracks.

WANTED CONVICTS TO CONDEMN BETTING

dealers, whose specialty is the Hackney horse. Mr. Yeager spoke with knowledge and positive experience, and

The thoroughbred, he said, was absolutely necessary to give the Hackney the quality that was now demanded, and the price was too high for people to pay for the kind of horses they wanted, and that kind could only be obtained by the use of the thoroughbred. Just before the sale, he said, four editions

thirty of them from half-bred mares, three of them from half-bred stallions, for \$11,600. The Hackney horse societies in Canada and in the United States recognized the need of the thorobred to such an extent that they were now registering in the stud book the progeny of a registered Hackney and a thorobred. Racing was necessary for the development of both the standard-bred and the thorobred, and breeding was necessary to maintain the meetings and purses on their present scale.

Without the revenue from betting the meetings would run to seed, and the stoppage of betting on the tracks meant the stoppage of development in breeding. All betting, Mr. Yeager thought, should be open and public, rather than in the surreptitious and uncontrolled fashion that would follow from the substitution of private and individual betting.

He cited the Tillsonburg, Wingham, Listowel, Stratford and other meetings as gatherings that were successful because of the revenue they derived

Mr. Raney tried hard to make him agree that the fact that some of the 400,000 people in Toronto abused and carried to excess their privileges, was sufficient cause for withdrawing the privileges from everybody, but Mr. Yeager would not concede that, and Mr. Raney abandoned the attempt.

Would Keep Money in Canada.

Chief of Police Siemlin of Brantford, which has no races and no "race-course evils," was called to prove that in his time, when he was a Toronto

detective up to six years ago, a number of undesirable people were in Toronto at race time. 'Charlie has "got religion" since he went to Brantford. His chief objection to the whole thing was that the American bookmakers were coming over here and took away a lot of money. He had no objection to the Canadian bookmakers. He knew a number of them, and they were decent and honorable men. He was confronted with the evidence of Chief Grasset and Inspector Duncan of Toronto with regard to the number of people who were in Toronto during the

On cross-examination Chief Fleming took back most of what he was made to say in his examination-in-chief. He did not know of a single case where any man had got into trouble by betting on racecourses. Like all of Mr. Rancey's witnesses, he had heard of them, but did not know.

A Toronto butcher, whose name in newspapers were asked not to, use that there was no particular reason why it should be suppressed, told of his endeavours for the last ten years to make the bookmaker, and his failure. He said he knew lots of others, chiefly butchers, who had no better success than himself.

He also failed to make a success of betting on football matches, foot races and fights, and had sworn off for a year. In that time, he declared, he intended to allow himself to bet on

but one event, the Jeffries-Johnson fight.
